Ban backlash gathers weight

CLUB secretaries are being asked to ballot their members about amending the smoking ban.

Several newspapers have reported that the Union has teamed up with the Save Our Pubs and Clubs campaign for separate smoking rooms and their Director Simon Clark is writing to all club secretaries with the aim of building on this. The Union is keen to emphasise to MPs that clubs are private places and that as long as staff are not inconvenienced, this should be a matter solely for members. Mr Clark will also be a guest of the Union when he addresses this year's conference at Blackpool on April 9. Full story - Page 6.

HE Coalition Government have missed the chance to tackle the biggest issue affecting clubs - the flood of cheap booze being sold at a loss by supermarkets.

Instead of banning the sale of alcohol below cost the Government are instead banning the sale of alcohol at below excise duty and VAT which is just 47p a pint. This will have virtually no impact on binge drinkers paying rock-bottom prices of beer in supermarkets while sociable and responsible drinkers continue to pay a premium.

Professor Ian Gilmore, a former President of the Royal College of Physicians, told BBC Radio 4's Today programme: "It's a step in the right direction but, I have to say, an extremely small step. It will have no impact whatsoever on the vast majority of cheap drinks sold in supermarkets."

MANIFESTO

General Secretary Mick McGlasham said: "We have been campaigning for a ban on below cost sales of alcohol, which was a clear manifesto commitment of both the Conservatives and the Liberal Democrats.

"This decision means clubs will continue to close as they are undercut by supermarkets selling canned beers at rock bottom prices. This will have a negligible impact as supermarkets sell only a tiny proportion of beer at below these levels.

"The Government keep talking about the Big Society and saying they want to encourage community organisations like our social clubs but they contine to impose higher costs and regulations on us and turn a blind eye to the irresponsible attitude of the supermarkets."

One clubman has been so annoyed he has started a group on Facebook to look at ways to save the clubs.

Shaun Whitaker, who is Concert Secretary and a Trustee at Intake Social Club in Doncaster, said: "I've been a member for 25 years now and I'm deeply concerned at the decline

YNEMOUTH Social Club's Peter Devlin has become one of the first clubmen in the North East to receive the Union's special

certificate for 50 years' service.

Peter (83) served on the Committee for 20 years and has just retired after 30 years as Club Secretary. Northumberland Branch Executive member Arnie Milne presented him with one of the new 50-year certificates and also presented a Certificate of Merit to Committee member Paul Renton.

Peter's father Frank and brother Vincent both served as chairmen of the Club. Peter, who was a seaman, joined

the club in 1951 and

then served on the Entertainment Committee before becoming Secretary. "I didn't want to join at first because I thought it was full of old men but I guess it was in my blood."

Real ale

He used to be in the club every night but these days he only comes down for about four nights a week for a half of lager and a few whiskies. He also comes into the office occasionally to help out new Secretary George Emmerson.

Peter recalls that Tynemouth Social was so busy it employed 23 full and part-time staff, compared with just three now. It is one of the few clubs in the North East to serve real ale, which has proved very popular though the fact it takes longer to serve is a problem at busy times.

The club's history is well documented in its own archive. It was opened in a cottage in the village in 1918. A year later the Committee bought an old Co-op on the main street for £2,500 and the club is still there. One of the Committee's next purchases was a piano, followed by a clown

slot machine, which paid out a jackpot of five shillings to anyone who could catch a penny in the clown's hat.

Like many clubs of the time the club had a news and reading room and a library was also open to members, with books being passed on to the workhouse. The club also used to stage lectures on a variety of subjects including history, drama and politics.

In the depression years of the 1920s, club member Henry Clark lent the club a radio, which people paid to use

and the proceeds
from that were
used to provide Christmas dinners
for unemployed members. There was

silence in the club when important announcements were made like the outbreak of war in 1939.

During the war the club abolished the position of treasurer as an economy measure and the jobless were allowed to play billiards for free during the day. The wartime beer shortage in 1942 meant no visitors were allowed in the club but the club made up for it on V-E day by giving members 10 free pints each to celebrate.

Peter also recalls how men and women were segregated but during his time as Secretary the club elected several women to the Committee. "Some

old timers were horrified but they were a great success and harder workers than men.

"Clubs are very sociable places and everybody knew everybody else, and you could enjoy a chat with anybody. Tynemouth is still a lovely club."



detrimental effect on the community and the lives of the people in the entertainment business.

"The links on this group, when I feel we've got enough to start shouting, will be posted to breweries, local MPs, radio

CLUB Secretaries are being asked to ballot their members to assess support for an amendment to the smoking ban.

Simon Clark, director of Save Our Pubs and Clubs (SOPAC), which has joined forces with the Union to lobby the

Government to allow separate smoking rooms in clubs and pubs, said: "We need to find out what members think

about the option of separate smoking rooms.

"If club secretaries can organise a ballot of their members it could be a vital campaigning tool. The results will interest not only the Union and SOPAC, but local newspapers will be interested too. It could give clubs some useful publicity."

It's vital that MPs understand that clubs are private places and that it should be up to members whether smoking is allowed. When the smoking ban was passed MPs were persuaded by the TUC that staff members' health was at risk — despite there being no evidence of this, or that anyone has ever died of "passive smoking." The EU, no less,

this, or that anyone has ever died of "passive smoking." The EU, no less, has refused to accept that non-smoking lung cancer sufferers should receive compensation for working in smoke-filled offices. In addition, most clubs had already banned

smoking at the bar and the Union is, of course, campaigning only for separate smoking rooms that would be cleaned and run by smokers.

The campaign to amend the smoking

Mr Clark added: "The smoking ban polarises opinion but this campaign is not just about the ban. It's about Big Government telling people how to live their lives. It's also about the importance of clubs and pubs in the local community.

"Do we sit back and do nothing while more and more clubs suffer or go out of business, or do we do everything we can to make them as welcoming as possible for smokers and nonsmokers alike?"

Meanwhile TV chef and publican Antony Worrall Thompson has re-stated his support for the Save Our Pubs and Clubs campaign.

"I know how important it is to offer people a comfortable place where they can eat, drink and, dare I say it, smoke.

"The smoking ban has been a disaster for many clubs and pubs and you can understand why. They used to be places where adults could meet and chat over a pint without the health police looking over their shoulders.

"It may be unfashionable to say so, but clubs need smokers and we must do as much as we can to accommodate them.

"If you share my view that the legislation is excessive please support the campaign."

LICENCE TO BILL?

RATES

WE were recently asked by a CIU club about the licences that clubs

have to obtain from their respective local authorities.

It seems that these are based on the new rateable values which came into effect last April. These rateable values can be challenged by making a rating appeal which we, as the approved supplier to the CIU, will be more than pleased to do.

The accumulated benefit of this is that this may bring the club into a lower banding for the licences, reduce

the cost of Sky, as outlined in my article in the August issue, and lower

the amount of business rates the club have to pay over the next five years.

We have gained an assurance from one local council that they will refund any overpayment of licence fees going back two years but circumstances may differ for other local authorities.

PROFESSOR BACKS NEW LINE CLEANING SYSTEM

NATIONAL Account Company CellarBright has had its revolutionary beer line cleaning system endorsed by a professor of brewing.

Dr David Quain from Heriot-Watt University in Edinburgh, a well-respected figure who has written many papers on beer line hygiene, carried out tests on CellarBright's system at two CIU clubs and concluded that bacteria in the lines had been reduced by an average of more than 70 per cent. Samples were taken under laboratory conditions on three ales, two lagers, a stout and a mild.



Club of the Month:

HARROWGATE

CLUB & INSTITUTE

HE founders of Harrowgate Club made a giant step 100 years ago by creating a purpose-built club in what was then a

A century on and the village of Harrowgate Hill is now part of Darlington while the club has not only embraced women, half of its Committee members are women.

The club was started by a group of men in 1907, who wanted somewhere to drink apart from the local pub. They opened in a back lane, then bought some land and borrowed £2,150 to build what is one of the Union's most striking clubs. The new premises were opened in 1914 by

Councillor George Zissler with a ceremonial gold key, which sadly has been

Soon after, at the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, the Army requisitioned the club and they must have liked

it, because they did the same for the Second World War in 1939. The men from the club who gave their lives in those two conflicts are commemorated in a magnificent roll of honour in the club's foyer.

After the war the club was in the safe hands of long-serving Club Secretary Bob Batey, who served on the Committee from 1922 to 1977 and included 21 years' service to the Durham Branch Executive. When he received his Gold Medal from the Branch the local paper commented that he was the only clubman in Durham to receive the award, making him one in 200,000. Among the artefacts in the club's possession is his invitation to the Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace, which has been framed and hangs in the main bar, which also celebrates long-serving President Len Parkin.

These days the Club Secretary is 35-yearold Stephen Cartwright, one of the

youngest in the Union. An accountant, he has set up an accounts system which means he and his father, Treasurer Dave Cartwright, can keep a close eye on all the club's income and outgoings. "It means you can monitor how things are," he says. "And pinpoint straight away which parts of the business are making money and which aren't."

One of the keys to the club's more recent success is that they have paid off all their brewery loans and are now in a position to negotiate with several breweries to make sure their members get the best deal on a pint. It wasn't always like that; the club's first extension in 1966, for instance, was opened by

> Colonel I. S. Alderson, a director of Sunderland's Vaux Breweries, who were then the club's main suppliers.

The extension created a larger bar which now includes a games

room on a different level with three tournament-sized snooker tables while another section includes a pool table and a table football machine. Racing fans are well served with a bookmaker's in the grounds of the club and as well as its snooker, pool, and football teams - the lifeblood of the club during the quiet midweek nights – the club has two other sporting champions. Boxer Stuart Hall is the British Bantamweight Champion and is one win away from retaining a Lonsdale Belt, while Darren Grey is the world champion one-armed golfer after winning the title in Scotland last June. He had to beat 47 other competitors to qualify then defeated players from England, Sweden, Scotland and Ireland to win the matchplay title. In September Darren also helped Europe to win the Fightmaster Cup, a onearmed version of the Ryder Cup.





Another corner of the bar in the style of a pub snug, officially known as the Gentlemen's lounge gained the nickname The House of Lords as it was home to 10 retired Committee men but proved less popular as they started finding their friends were all dying off.

A second £190,000 extension was opened in 1980 and other improvements the club has made include turning what was at one time a quoits pitch into their extensive car park and, more recently, spending £32,000 to build a lift up to the concert room on the first floor. "It's made a huge difference to the disabled members we have in the

club," says Dave. Marston's In 2006, the year before the smoking ban, the club had created its own smoking area. Because they expected to suffer when the smoking ban was introduced it was decided to give women full equality for the first time in the club's 100-year history. The result is that the club now has between 200 and 300 women members, as well as a woman Assistant Secretary in June Sowerby and five women Committee members.



COUNTING THE COST OF SICKNESS LEAVE

THE average cost of sickness absence in the UK for 2009 was estimated at £692 for each employee per year (an increase of £26 per annum on 2008.) Staff absence rates in the UK for 2009 have decreased slightly to 7.4 days per employee per year from 8.0 days per employee in 2008.

- It is therefore important that clubs tackle sickness absence with a
- decreasing the frequency of shortterm sickness absences;
- facilitating a speedy return to work in each case, following short or long periods of absence;
- making informed decisions about the viability of sick employees' future employment.

Key elements

With regard to an employee's persistent short-term sickness absences, clubs must:

- carry out a fair review of the employee's attendance record and determine the reasons for the absences;
- give the employee an opportunity to make representations;
- inform the employee of the possible (or probable) consequences if his or her attendance record does not improve;
- ensure compliance with the ACAS Code of Practice.
- The key elements for clubs in dealing with an employee's long-term sickness absences are:
- consultation with the employee, ie maintaining regular contact throughout the period of absence and fully involving the employee in the decision-making process;
- Medical investigation, ie gathering medical evidence/opinion on the employee's condition, the medical prognosis and the likelihood of a swift return to work and the suitability of the current job. The introduction of "fit notes" and computergenerated eMed3 certificates in April 2010 should assist this process. A doctor now selects from two key options:
- may be fit for work taking account of the following advice;
- not fit for work.
- Of course, the employee may be fit to return unconditionally. When the employee "may be fit for work" the doctor has four further options to select from:
- phased return to work;

- There is no option available to select making a referral to an occupational health advisor as it was felt that this could delay the employee's return to work.

The option to return the employee to work under one or more conditions could make it difficult for some clubs to accommodate employees' requirements. Although clubs are not obliged to follow the doctor's recommendation a refusal to do so could raise a number of practical and legal problems.

Should the employee be told he/she could return to work on a part-time basis and be paid half their normal salary this may encourage them to dispute the doctor's decision when

leave on full pay. Consideration, where appropriate, of alternative employment, modified working and/or reasonable adjustments in the case of disabled employees before any decision to dismiss the

'Reasonable adjustments" might include working from home or altering working hours to avoid the rush hour. Temporary changes along the same lines might also be made to ease the return to work of other, non-disabled employees. One solution could be to extend the flexible working policy to include those returning from sick leave, but to vary contractual terms and conditions temporarily. To assist in facilitating employees' return to work, the maximum period someone can be "signed off" once is reduced from six to three months.

Change the light bulb

THE EU announced in 2009 that a new directive on carbon emissions and greenhouse gases means incandescent lamps, (hot filament wire bulbs) are to be phased out and will be banned completely by 2012.

This means that wherever traditional 240-volt light bulbs are used in offices, shops, homes, schools, pubs, clubs and across industry generally, they will have to be replaced by law, with low-energy equivalents. The lamps affected include standard B.C./E.S. 40W, 60W, 100W and 150W bulbs, candle lamps, pygmy lamps, SES lamps, and 35W/50W GU10 lamps. In addition to these, 8ft fluorescent tubes are also being phased

Lamp manufacturers are producing state-of-the-art high specification replacements known as Compact Fluorescent Lamps (CFLs) which are both longer lasting and more energyefficient than the traditional incandescent bulbs. For example, a standard 100W B.C./E.S. lamp with an average life of 1,000 hours can be replaced with a 20W lamp with an average life of 10,000 hours.

Because these lamps consume less power, they are rated in a different way and it can be confusing to know and understand exactly what choice to make when trying to select a suitable replacement. Significant savings can be made, since about 20 per cent of energy consumed is used in lighting.

Replacing the lamps is only the first step in longer term energy cost reduction. Changing the actual light fitting to a higher efficiency, low-energy alternative will involve some capital investment cost but the payback benefits are permanent, month after month, year after year.

Changing is not an option: it is a requirement.


Afterwards members and guests enjoyed an evening of music and laughter and a buffet provided by the club.

EMPLOYMENT LAW QUIZ ANSWERS

QUESTION 1: Answer a)

If the time eventually comes when all procedures have been exhausted, all avenues explored and the job can no longer be kept open, the employee should be fully consulted and informed about possible dismissal. In reaching a decision to dismiss, the club's capability or dismissal procedures must be followed and the club must at least comply with its own procedures and the Acas code of practice on disciplinary and grievance procedures

QUESTION 2: Answer b)

Sick notes, medical certificates or "fit notes" arise when employees are ill or injured. GPs provide these as proof to the club that the employees are genuinely sick.

"Fit notes" (or fitness for work statements) were introduced last April to replace the old sick notes. The old sick note system had been in operation since 1948 and was seen to be in need of modernisation to help address the vast number of employees on longterm sickness absence or incapacity benefits. It is hoped that the new system will encourage employees back to work more quickly.

As well as a change of name, there are several practical differences in the approach to be taken over the provision of these notes. It is fair to say, however, that the most important change is a conceptual shift focusing on the work employees can do, rather than what they cannot do.

It is important to emphasise that clubs' duties to pay statutory sick pay and make reasonable adjustments under the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 (DDA) remain unaffected. Clubs should be wary of contravening the DDA if the employee's health problems qualify as a disability.

QUESTION 3: Answer a)

Data relating to the reasons for sickness absence is sensitive personal data according to the Data Protection Act 1998. Part 2 of the employment practices data protection code dealing with employment records suggests that absence records should be recorded separately from sickness records.

Part 4 of the Code dealing with medical records and health information established the general principle that employers should only collect information relating to the health of individual workers if:

- express, freely given consent has been provided by the worker(s) concerned, or
- the collection is necessary to enable compliance with the employer's legal obligations, for example, to prevent breaching the health and safety regulations and/or anti-discrimination rules.

Collection of medical records and health information relating to individual workers not covered by the above is likely to be unlawful and a breach of the Data Protection Act 1998.

QUESTION 4: Answer a)

The Access to Medical Reports Act 1988 requires express consent from an employee before a club can approach the employee's GP for a medical report.

- A club should draft a consent form for the employee to sign making it clear that they are giving consent to the GP to supply a medical report. In accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998 details of sickness absence and medical reports are classified as sensitive personal data and should therefore not be disclosed to third parties without express consent. There are also strict rules about patient confidentiality and therefore no GP will disclose information unless they are sure the employee has consented to its release.

RACING is a sport of constantly changing fortunes. Today's fashionable and successful trainer, boasting a yard bursting with talented horses, only needs a couple of bad seasons and those fair-weather owners for whom having the 'right' trainer is so important, are likely to desert him in droves.

Looking at the current champion trainers' table, with Nigel Twiston-Davies occupying sec-

ond position, close behind leader and reigning champion Paul Nicholls, it is easy to forget that at the time Twiston-Davies won the Grand National for the second time in 2002 with Bindaree he was disillusioned with training, burdened with debt, and on the verge of handing in his licence. Winning the "world's greatest steeplechase" with Bindaree, after he first landed it in 1998 with Earth Summit, helped him to re-evaluate

the Totesport Cheltenham Gold Cup with Imperial Commander, the Christie's Foxhunter Chase with Baby Run and the Grand Annual Chase Handicap with Pigeon Island. This season has seen the Grange Hill Farm stables continuing its great run of success, landing three major prizes

> during November alone, namely the Paddy Power Gold Cup (Little Josh), the Betfair Chase (Imperial Commander) and

the Becher Chase (Hello Bud). By early last month, Twiston-Davies had notched up more than 70 seasonal winners, just a couple short of Paul Nicholls, and had amassed in excess of £750,000 in prize money. Significantly, apart from Nicholls, he was the only handler in the top ten to have recorded a profit to a level £1 stake – a somewhat impressive £26.38. Nigel first took out a permit to train in the early 1980s, combining racing

his career, and inevitably brought him new owners and new horses, giving him the encouragement necessary to carry on.

It is as well he did so, as since then the Gloucestershire trainer has continued his winning ways, culminating in a memorable day at last season's Cheltenham Festival, when he won

However, the agricultural recession led him to become a full-time trainer in 1989, being partnered for a spell in the training venture by childhood friend and former champion jump jockey Peter Scudamore. Today, his business partner is another former

> Llewellyn, and overall the Twiston-Davies stable has recorded well in excess of 1,000 winners. Numerically, the trainer's best campaign came in 2007/8, when the Grange Hill Farm team notched up 87 winners. This season, that record looks highly likely to fall, and with 13 winners at the Cheltenham Festival to his credit, Twiston-Davies is looking forward to next month's renewal of the great meeting at his local course with eager anticipation. Imperial Commander now seems likely to go straight to the Festival to defend his crown, and it would be a brave or foolish man who bet against the Naunton handler adding to his Cheltenham Festival tally in 2011.
