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HE Union has teamed up with the campaigning organisation Save our Pubs and Clubs (SOPAC) to step up pressure on the Government to review the smoking

Recent decisions in Denmark and Holland have seen rules relaxed for small bar owners and a recent phonein on BBC Radio 5 Live confirms that the issue is not dead.

General Secretary Mick McGlasham attended a meeting at Westminster recently with Greg Knight, Brian Binley and David Nuttall, all MPs who have tried their best to get the Government to allow clubs and pubs to have a smoking room. The campaign will focus on the effects that the ban has had on member clubs and pubs - the loss of community networking opportunities for the elderly and ex-servicemen, the failure of the previous government to honour its promise for a formal review of the legislation and the need for a more balanced approach to the issue of smoking in public places.



SOPAC propose to undertake a social impact study on the effects of the smoking ban as a way to open the debate and reinvigorate the issue and they hope the campaign will focus on clubs and pubs being allowed a separate smoking room with appropriate ventilation. The Union General Secretary emphasised that, along with

below-cost supermarket alcohol pricing and excessive regulation, the smoking ban has been a key part in the demise of clubs.

The All-Party Parliamentary Group is also planning a campaign, along with other groups in Parliament representing similar organisations, to rally support and lobby government to take some positive action to help clubs stay open.



No more large bills to pay...meaning more money in **YOUR** bank

HE new Police and Social Responsibility Bill had its Second Reading in the Commons on December 13. It proposes several changes to the 2003 Licensing Act.

Most significantly clubs who fail to pay their annual fee to the local licensing authority by the required date will, if this is not paid within 21 days, face the possibility of a fine of up to £20,000 and a possible six-month prison sentence should they continue to trade. The Bill gives the local authority the power to automatiin licensing matters will be replaced by "in the relevant licensing authority's area likely to be affected by" e.g. a licensing application;

- Existing requirements for the licensing authority to take steps "necessary" for promoting the 2003 Act's licensing objectives to be replaced by steps "appropriate" to those objectives. Licensing authorities would thereby have wider scope to apply conditions to licences and CPCs;
- The present provision whereby only the Police can object to a Temporary Event Notice (TEN) and then only in relation to the crime and disorder objective to be extended

cally suspend a CPC or premises licence where the annual fee has not been paid.

Other proposals include:

- Guidance to licensing authorities will indicate that there should be a presumption that all reasonable recommendations from the Police should be accepted;
- Local licensing authorities and primary care trusts will be added to the existing responsible authorities which may raise objections or make representations relating to licensing applications, reviews etc;
- The "vicinity" requirement for responsible authorities and interested parties to intervene

to the Environmental Health Authority and they and the Police may object in relation to any of the four licensing objectives;

- TENs for premises already licensed (including clubs with a CPC) could be subject to existing licence conditions. Provision is also in the Bill for a limited number of TENs for as little as five days before the event rather than the standard 10-day minimum.
- Clubs are advised that if their rule book does not already include the Interpretation Rule - "In these rules, words denoting the masculine gender shall be deemed to include

the feminine" - this will need to be adopted to provide full and equal membership for all members.

- The Rules Department at Head Office is happy to assist with the preparation of the new rule for registration with the FSA.
- The Union recommends adoption although the Equality Act over-rides any club rules.

NES ROLL BACK SMOKING

SOMEONE said to me recently that once a law is introduced, it is impossible to change it. They were speaking in the context of the campaign, supported by MPs of other parties, to reform our smoking laws, as they apply to pubs and clubs.

It is certainly an uphill battle to get Parliament to change a law once it has been introduced, particularly when any change is opposed by powerful interest groups, such as the British Medical Association and

However, Denmark has shown that it can be done. Recently, in that country, they have decided to revise their smoking ban because it was closing down small bars. Now the Danes have decided to introduce more flexibility to allow the small bar owner to decide what his or her own rules should be.

Provided non-smokers remain catered for, we should be reviewing our smoking ban here too.

At a time when the press is full of so much bad news, it is heartening to see that our clubs continuing to undertake much charitable fund-raising.




MEMBERS of Parliament of all parties are becoming increasingly concerned about the laxity of our food labelling law.

Incredibly, under our current rules, foreign meat imported into Britain which is just processed and packaged here, can be labelled as "British" and can display a Union Jack on its packaging. This means that shoppers who think they are supporting British farmers may be doing no such thing, but instead purchasing a foreign inferior product.

Following questioning from me, it then transpired that second rate chicken, injected with water, salt and, of all things, beef protein, can still be marketed as "chicken fillets" provided in the small print these other ingredients are mentioned. But how

many shoppers read the small print? In my view, producers should be required to state in large lettering precisely what it is they are selling. There is a growing view at Westminster among all politicians that our food labelling laws need to be tightened and you would think this is something that we could do without any further shilly-shallying. Unfortunately, this is not the case as we have given away power on food labelling to the European Union and so any further changes here will need to be undertaken by discussion and consent with our part-





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AN Ex-Servicemen's Club has proved old soldiers never die by reopening after 10 years – with the help of an Earl.

Watford Ex-Servicemen's was opened at the end of the First World War in 1918 thanks to a gift of a club house from the Earl of Clarendon, with a covenant that there should always be a place for former servicemen to meet in the town.

Ten years ago the club house was in such a poor state that the club needed more than £1million to keep going – money it didn't have and it was decided to build flats on the site to keep going.

Committee members contacted the current Earl who supported their bid for new premises and when the club put the contract out to tender it was agreed that whoever built on the site would also build a new club.

In the 1930s, the club became the Royal British Legion Club and remained so until the 1960s. When conscription was abolished, it was found that there weren't as many ex-servicemen around, so it was decided to allow non-servicemen to join, and the club became the Watford Ex-Service & Social Club Limited

By the year 2000 the club's building was in decay and to repair it the club needed to find £1million that they didn't have.

"We looked into the cost of repair to the club in 2000," said Alf, a former submariner. "We had one floor that was condemned and the other two floors were beginning to fall into disrepair.

"The cost of refurbishing the old club house would have been at least one million pounds and quite probably up to two million pounds.

OLD SERVICEMEN'S CLUB REFUSES TO FADE AWAY

A block of flats, called appropriately, Flanders Court, was finished in 2010 with a new club being built on the ground floor. It was officially opened in late November by the Chairman of Watford Council, Alan Burtenshaw, and by Union Vice-President John Tobin, who is also Secretary of the North West Metropolitan Branch.

"We were determined to keep the club going and we thought this was the only option open to us," said Club President Alf Jobson, a former submariner. "We are lucky to have been given this opportunity in this financial climate and we hope to attract even more members."

When the original club opened the Earl stipulated that there should always be a club on the site for the exservicemen of Watford, so they had a place where they could meet up with each other and talk about the times they had during their service days.

The club did not have that kind of money so it was with great sadness that we decided to put it out to tender. It was a decision that was not taken lightly by the members "


The £1.7m development has, however, proved a big success. Now the club needs to track down former members and recruit some new ones.

On my travels club secretaries have expressed varying degrees of enthusiasm for this cover. Some see it as invaluable, while others are dismissive.

the financial future of the club and ensure your own peace of mind.

So what does legal expenses cover include? The CIU Insurance Services policy offers a basic advice help line – the Law Phone – which provides advice on all business-related legal matters subject to the following limits:

Most of us are laymen when it comes to the law and what we think is the correct procedure could be totally wrong so we need to speak to the experts.

You can and probably do speak to your Branch Secretary. They will

give you the same advice as the Law Phone but the difference is that if the case does proceed the insurance company will pay the legal fees and any award for damages; your Branch

Secretary will not.

We cannot stress enough how important it is to consult the Law Phone before any action is taken by you that could prejudice a claim as if you don't your insurers could refuse to help

For example, if the club had an employee who was

off sick for three weeks but the Committee knew they were fit for work, they might

sack this unreliable employee and take on a new replacement. If the club rings the Law Phone, explains the situation and does exactly as they are advised then if the employee pursues an action against the club all legal expenses and damages are paid by the insurers.

Should they dismiss this employee or take any similar action without first seeking Law Phone's advice, insurers will refuse to provide any assistance if, in their opinion, there is not greater than a 50 per cent chance of winning the case.

The service is free and gives peace of mind. Phones are manned 24 hours a day

BEWARE OF CONFINED SPACES

VEN though confined spaces legislation has been around for some time, many clubs have taken no action to comply with their duties under the regulations.

"Knowledge of confined spaces regulations and what a club should do to comply is still surprisingly low across the country," says BOC Sureserve's CIU account manager Richard Nixon. "We have been advising clubs on these issues for some time; we are always willing to provide advice and carry out the necessary risk assessment. If a club uses dispense gases then these regulations will apply".

The Confined Spaces Regulations came into force in 1998 and require a "suitable and sufficient" assess-

ment to be made of the foreseeable safety hazards for a range of "specified risks".

The major risk for clubs is in the cellar where the accidental release of dispense gas into the atmosphere could cause loss of consciousness or asphyxiation to anyone working in the area.

Q. Is risk assessment a legal requirement?

Yes. The Confined Spaces Regulations 1997 together with the Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations require that a "confined space" be suitably and sufficiently assessed for all specified risks that constitute a potential safety hazard to persons entering or working in the area.

Q. What are a club's duties under the legislation?

Identify and assess specified risks

This could be a licensee or appointed expert, for example, a BOC Sureserve expert on dispense gas safety

Q. Who will be monitoring compliance with the Confined Spaces Regulations?

Environmental Health Officers are

- Devise an action plan to reduce such risks
- Create a safe system of work for all those who work in or have reason to enter the confined space
- Train all personnel who might enter the confined space
- Record risk assessment findings and actions and review at regular intervals
- Devise a recovery plan in the event of an incident

Q. What are the consequences of noncompliance?

Failure to comply could result in the Environmental Health Officer applying a prohibition notice on the outlet, prosecution of the licensee and any insurance policy may be invalidated.

Q. Who carries out the risk assessment?

A competent person should carry out the assessment and it should be documented. Health and Safety Executive (HSE) guidance on competency states this is "someone with sufficient experience of, and familiarity with, the relevant processes, plant and equipment so that they understand the risks involved and can devise necessary precautions to meet the requirements

responsible for checking that cellars are safe working environments and that all reasonable measures have been taken to comply with the requirements of health and safety legislation.

Q. How much does it cost?

With BOC Sureserve's Cellar Gas Management Service a full confined spaces risk assessment is carried out free of charge.

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▼ OME clubs are described as a barn of a place and that's literally the case with Barnby Dun Social Club.

Most clubs in the Doncaster area tend to be in mining villages but Barnby Dun is a riverside agricultural community. There's a clue in the name: Barnby Dun was originally the Barn by the Don and when the Social Club opened just over 100 years ago it was housed in what had been an old highroofed barn. And despite its High Street address the club is situated down what was an old farm track and easily defeats the efforts of modern satellite navigation.

Despite that it's close enough to the town to be part of Doncaster and was opened by the Mayor of Doncaster on June 10, 1907. It joined the CIU shortly afterwards and still has its original receipt book from the Union. The Reverend S J Rolfe was its first President and thanks to him and its first Secretary Stanley Brightmore the club thrived.

Their good work was carried on by Reg Morris, Jack Hickley and Ron Lunn, who oversaw the club's expansion in the boom years of the 60s and 70s.

The current building opened in November 1965 and an extension that included the concert room was added in the 1980s. The concert

as far away as Lincoln and York. It also stages live music on Wednesday nights and Friday evenings

and is well used for charity concerts. Among the causes the club has supported are Guide Dogs for the Blind, the RNLI and the Yorkshire Air Ambulance.

The club has also established a reputation for its snooker with the club's team reaching the last eight in the CIU National Championships and club member Ian Glover winning the Individual Title in 2007.

The concert room is the home of one of clubland's most unusual memorials. David Salter, who was a member of the club for 75 years and served as a Committee member and Trustee for more than 50 years until his death in 1997, has been celebrated by the club – with a picture of his spaniel Pip. The club also have reason to be grateful to his two sons, Norman, who served 40 years and Bill, who holds the Long Service Award for 25 years.

"David was a fantastic servant of the club," said Club Secretary Arthur Rollin. "He joined at 18 and was a member until his death at 93. He loved his dogs and this seemed an appropriate way to remember him."

Also celebrated, in the snug, is former Secretary Ron Lunn, who retired

in 1983 and is pictured outside the village's 14th century church, St Peter and St Paul, where he was a bell ringer.

The agricultural community of Barnby Dun was transformed when the shallow River Don was canalised allowing trade between Hull, Doncaster and Sheffield. A railway and sidings arrived in the mid-nineteenth century and in 1860 local landowner George Milnthorp brought more prosperity to the village with his first malt kiln, which meant malt was dried and turned and when ready added to beer. This meant that the farm labourers could work all year.

Thorpe Marsh Power Station was commissioned in 1959 and brought more Social Club in High Street, Barnby employment and people to the village. THE Union's policy in the past has been to allow women with limited rights to attend education courses, recreational games and the Holiday & Convalescent Centre (now Saltburn House).

The Equality Act came into operation on 1 October, 2010. All reference to male members in a club's rulebook now refers to lady members. It is recommended that a club's rule book is updated to reflect this. In any event the Equality Act will over-ride all rules. The rules will need to be updated to provide equal membership rights for all members.

Change to PRS Tariff

THE Performing Right Society (PRS) has amended the way it adjusts its charges to allow for inflation. Instead of basing its calculations on the Average Earnings Index it will now use the Average Weekly Earnings measure.

The full text of the PRS's charges (Tariff JMC) was published in our August issue and it can also be found online. Paragraph 5 relating to inflation now

"Every year on August 1 the monetary sums in this tariff will be adjusted for inflation. The adjustment formula will apply to the standard rates, using the mean (to the nearest whole percentage point) of the percentages by which the Retail Prices Index and Average Weekly Earnings Index (unadjusted) change in the year to the previous March.

(March is the latest month before the anniversary date for which figures are likely to be published for both indices).

After application of the inflation adjustment any expenditure threshold figure will be rounded to the nearest pound with all other royalty rates rounded to the nearest penny. All royalties will be charged at the royalty rate in force at the beginning of the licence year."

YOUR STAFF HANDBOOK IS AN THE importance of an upto-date Staff Handbook IMPORTANT TOOL

HE importance of an upto-date Staff Handbook cannot be overemphasised. The club's staff need to know the rules of the club in which they work. They also need to know the basis and the justification for these rules (policy) as well as what they and others are expected to do (procedures).

Staff Handbooks are important for club officials and stewards also. They provide the proof that the staff are aware of the rules of the club they are being asked to uphold, and include information about obligations accepted by the club. The Staff Handbook is therefore a fundamental tool to help club secretaries run the club smoothly and efficiently. **DEFINITION**

Staff Handbooks cover general policies and outline procedures, and are informal in style. They provide guidance and information and are read in conjunction with the Statement of Main Terms of Employment.

USING A STAFF HANDBOOK

- Staff Handbooks are used:
- as a source of referenceas a means of communicating
- as an aid to induction
- to comply with statutory requirements

In addition to Staff Handbooks, many clubs have a copy specifically produced for secretaries and stewards as an up-to-date reference document. These contain information on such subjects as conducting a disciplinary interview and dealing with a poor sickness record. Staff Handbooks need to be kept current and be subject to amendment as employment legislation changes, normally each October and April.

BENEFITS

Staff Handbooks offer an opportunity for the club to make a clear statement of what is important, and its culture and values. They can be a significant aid to induction, because they provide consistent, clear information that a new member of the club's staff can read at a time convenient to him or her.

The thorough research involved in preparing a Staff Handbook leads to

with a vast amount of information, which can become unwieldly unless properly managed, and the Staff Handbook is the ideal reference tool to simplify matters.

Clubs should introduce Staff Handbooks with the following in mind:-

- A Staff Handbook provides a means of ensuring every member of staff receives the same information in the same format
- A Staff Handbook helps to assure

clearer employment practices since they often reveal out-of-date policies and procedures, which can be conflicting, unproductive, destructive to teamwork, not supportive of the club culture, incomprehensible and often, unsafe!

A Staff Handbook also allows written statements of main terms and conditions of employment to be kept to a reasonable length. Clubs are now required to supply their staff

Inconsistent and discriminatory practices are discouraged

- A Staff Handbook will also support secretaries and stewards in enforcing club requirements and procedures and help to minimise the potential for unhealthy disputes between secretaries/officials/committees and staff

- Clear policies and procedures help to avoid costly Employment Tribunal claims and improve staff relations.

Staff Handbooks, designed and specifically produced for CIU-affiliated clubs are particularly useful and prove to be a very cost-effective method of improving staff relations and at the same time being legally compliant. The aim is to provide a format and content that is best suited to the culture and values of clubs. An off-the-peg version that is cold and impersonal may contain most statutory requirements but does not address the specific and unique issues in a social club environment.

CLUBS MAY BE PAYING TOO MUCH TO AGE

THE entertainment trade union Equity thinks clubs booking acts are sometimes paying too much to unscrupulous agents.

Equity's Variety Advisory Committee has had its attention drawn to various business practices which, while not necessarily illegal, result in the artist seeing less of their fee and agents seeing more. Manchester Variety Branch Secretary Yvonne Joseph believes that because there is less work

around in general some agents are seeking to increase their income from commission for the work that is there. They do this by deliberately introducing additional agents into the chain, who needn't be there, with both agents taking a cut from the work.

For example, if a club approaches one agent (Agent A) to book a certain act this agent could suggest another agent (Agent B) that the club should approach. The club then books the artist through Agent B and agrees a fee of £300. He then goes to Agent A to actually book the act

offering the fee of £200, which is agreed, thereby clearing a profit of

Agent A will then deduct his normal commission from the artist's fee of 15% (+VAT) leaving the artist with £164 in total. With groups of agents all doing this for each other it is clear that a sizeable amount of money is being paid out by clubs to agents unnecessarily. This sort of thing used to go on after licensing for agencies was first abolished and has now made a comeback since the onset of the recession.

Other practices see artists wait-

ing three months or more for their fee or agents taking very large cuts of the overall fee when operating in "buy and sell" net deal arrangements. The agents concerned do not tend to be the more reputable ones such as those who are members of the Agents' Association. Although Equity supports the return of licensing for agencies it is not thought likely that the current government would consider it as they are generally in favour of deregulation.

Equity's Variety Advisory Committee suggests that more clubs should consider booking the artists directly which would result in

them obtaining a better price. Of course many clubs may be concerned about what would happen if the artist were unable to fulfil the gig, for any reason, at short notice. Many of Equity's Variety Branches can assist with this, however, as they have many artists on their books.

Clubs should get to know their local Variety Branch Secretary, who should be able to assist in finding a replacement in these circumstances.

QUESTION 1 Answer b)

While there is no legal requirement for clubs to issue Staff Handbooks to their staff, the importance of an up-to-date club Staff Handbook cannot be overemphasised.

The club staff needs to know the rules of the club in which they work. The staff needs to know the basis and the justification for these rules (policy) as well as what they and others are expected to do (pro-

Staff Handbooks are important for club officials and stewards also. They provide the proof that the staff are aware of the rules the club is asking them to uphold, and include information about obligations accepted by the club. The Staff Handbook is therefore a fundamental tool to help club secretaries run the club smoothly and efficiently.

QUESTION 2 Answer b)

Staff Handbooks need to be thoroughly researched and carefully written. Those sections of the Staff Handbook should clearly show which sections are contractually binding on both parties, and those

parts which are intended to be for information only, and are not contractually binding. An example of this would be the club's disciplinary and appeals procedure. This should be described as being noncontractual; otherwise. if the club does not follow its requirements, it could give rise to a claim in the Employment Tribunal for breach of contract.

QUESTION 3 Answer(s) a) and

Staff handbooks are used as a source of reference, as a means of communicating, as an aid to induction, to comply with statutory requirements, and to ensure that all staff have the same information on the same document. In addition, a Staff Handbook is tangible evidence of the club's commitment to being a good employer. Many clubs have a copy specifically produced for secretaries and stewards for an up-to-date reference document. These contain information on such subjects as conducting a disciplinary interview, or dealing with a poor sickness record. Staff Handbooks need to be kept current and be subject to amendment as employment legislation changes, normally each October and April.

QUESTION 4 Answer b)

While there is no statutory requirement for clubs to issue Staff Handbooks, the benefits of a Staff Handbook are many. Compiling a Staff Handbook

leads to clearer employment policies and procedures and often reveals procedures that are conflicting, unproductive, destructive to teamwork, not supportive of the club culture, incomprehensible and often, unsafe. Staff Handbooks are read in conjunction with the Statement of Particulars of Main Terms and Conditions of Employment, which is a statutory requirement.

THE recent death of Scottish racehorse trainer Peter Monteith has robbed the racing world of one of its brightest talents and most charming

Monteith, 61, was based at Rosewell, 10 miles south of Edinburgh. He was born nearby at Dalkeith, the son of Colonel Willie Monteith, a notable racehorse owner,

The first horse of note he trained was Moment of Truth, who cost just £4,200 and went on to win 17 races, most notably the £24,000 Northumberland Gold Cup Novices Chase at Newcastle in 1990. Another multiple winner was the hurdler, Rossel, who won on 12 occasions.

Monteith's most notable achievement, however, came when he

and was always involved with horses. riding and show jumping from an early age. Although the young Peter served a surveying apprenticeship and ultimately qualified as a chartered surveyor, horses were always his first love, and he began point-topointing, setting up a modest equestrian yard near the Forth Bridge, where he bred and dealt.

In 1981 Monteith was granted a permit to train

family-owned racehorses and moved to Whitebog Farm at Rosewell, where he remained for

the rest of his life. He took out a full training licence in 1984 and with a stable of around a dozen horses he set about the uphill task of putting Whitebog on the racing map. He proved adept at bringing horses back to the racecourse after suffering injury or failing to thrive in the regimes of larger training establishments.

scored a rare Cheltenham Festival victory for Scotland, sending the sixyear-old mare Dizzy to Prestbury Park in 1994 to land the County Hurdle in the hands of Tony Dobbin.

Dobbin was one of several good jockeys given chances by Monteith in the early stages of their careers. More recently, the Borders riders Wilson Renwick and Ryan Mania benefited from the trainer's willingness to give

> young talent opportunities.

Sadly, Dizzy, owned by Monteith's father, was killed in a fall in the

Scottish Champion Hurdle a month after her famous Cheltenham success, and Monteith never quite got hold of another horse of her calibre. He continued to vie for the role of leading Scottish jumps handler, however, with Dumfriesshire-based Len Lungo through the 1990s.

His best National Hunt season,

however, came in 2007-8 when he turned out 34 winners, and during his 25 seasons with a full licence, Monteith recorded more than 400 victories, both over jumps and on the level, with multiple successes coming from horses such as Beldine, Cita Verda and Los Nadis.

Being based in Scotland meant Peter Monteith never attracted the level of investment from owners that his skills deserved.

Tributes from jockeys, owners and fellow trainers in the aftermath of Peter Monteith's death spoke of his humour, good companionship, fine horsemanship, and perhaps above all, his ability always to make the very most of limited resources. He was a true gentleman of the Scottish turf.


He was presented with the trophy by Branch President Alan Hardy, Branch Secretary Dave Richardson and National Executive member Sid Hicks.
