NEC BEGIN HUNT FOR A GENERAL SECRETARY

The National Executive have responded to the decision of this year's Conference and put in place a timetable for the election of the next General Secretary. Letters from Union President George Dawson were sent out to all clubs on June 13 inviting nominations for the post by July 18. Ballot papers will be sent out to clubs, which will have one vote each, on August 1 and will need to be returned by August 29.

The votes will be counted on Monday, September 1 to give a result before the

National Executive meeting on September 3. The result will be released to the candidates and then to clubs after the meeting and the result will be published in full in the October issue of *Club Journal*.

The post will carry an honorarium, the same as is paid to the President. "It is specified in our constitution that the General Secretary will be an officer not an employee and will act under the direction and control of the National Executive," said Mr Dawson.

"We accept the decision of the Conference which voted to continue to have a General Secretary whose role is set out in Rule 18 of the Constitution."

Club President Anita Savory has been awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours for her services to communities in County Durham.

Anita, who has been an independent county councillor since 2008 was given the award in recognition of her charity work. She has raised £50,000 for the Multiple Sclerosis Society with a series of Stars in their Eyes nights as well as for MIND, a local hospice and many other causes. Last year she held a special ladies' evening at Wolsingham Constitutional Club for Wear Valley Women's Aid which operates a women's refuge in Bishop Auckland.

In July 2012 the Constitutional Club was within an hour of folding when officials from the Durham Branch with the papers

to wind up the club came to a special meeting but Anita persuaded members to come forward to commit themselves to work unpaid to keep the club open.

"My father Pat Gallagher was President here for 25 years and he worked so hard for this club. I said we would regret it for ever if the club closed down and thanks to the hard work of the Committee we've kept going.

"We've been prepared to try any kind of event to attract members. As well as a Ladies' Night, we've had country and western evenings and quizzes and recently we've had a children's primary school disco where the parents have come and been able to enjoy a few drinks.

"We now have 40 people on a Sunday night where we used to have about six. Every little counts so I'll be celebrating when we have 41." Weardale, the valley where the club is situated is a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and the club also attracts campers and caravanners as well as locals.

A North East club has marked a couple's 20 years of service - by giving them an extra day off.

The Committee recognised their achievement by presenting Shirley with a bouquet of flowers and giving them Sunday, May 25 off work so they could have lunch with their family.



The couple were originally hired by the club's former Chairman - and Union President -Terry Watson, who said: "Steve and Shirley have been great for the club. They make a great team as they work together well and they're both very hard working."

Their daughter Donna said: "I'm delighted that given the economic downturn, the historical attrition in bar work and the severe financial difficulties clubs have faced especially in most recent years that my parents' commitment to their work should be recognised.

"They are well known not just in their local community but in the wider CIU as Terry Watson was so highly regarded not just in his own role but for the performance of his own club."

Current Chairman Gordon Turnbull said it was what Terry would have wanted had he still been part of the Committee.



A day of celebrations has taken place at Grange-over-Sands on Morecambe Bay to mark the centenary of the Union's third Convalescent Home.

Local celebrity Cedric Robinson MBE, who has been the Queen's Guide to the Sands for 50 years, was invited by the Home's current owners Brancaster Care to unveil a plaque and to open the day's events on June 28, which included staff at the home dressing in First World War outfits, clog dancing and music from a brass band called The Old Contemptibles.

The Union bought the three-acre site for £1.430 in 1912 and originally estimated it would cost £12,000 but bad weather and the war meant it eventually cost £26,000.

The foundation stone was laid on Whit Monday in 1914 though the building was hampered by the outbreak of the First World War later that year and it did not open until 1916, when it was initially used for injured troops.


The Home followed Pegwell Bay in Kent and Saltburn in North Yorkshire to become the third opened during the 36 years the great B T Hall was General Secretary. The Union had a home at each corner of England and Wales when Langland Bay near Swansea opened in 1922.

Grange was sold by the Union in 1990 and bought by Brancaster Care nine years ago, who now run it as the Cartmel Grange home. Many of the marvellous original features

of the home have been restored including a cast concrete listed statue of a soldier known locally as Albert and thought to be the oldest in the world - which was originally presented to the home by Normanton Central Liberal Club.



Albert was restored after an appeal locally, which included donations from Brancaster Care and by local MP Tim Farron, who carried out a sponsored six-mile run from the statue to Somme Avenue, Ravenstown and back.

How the letter is headed

Don't be fooled by this scam letter

We are grateful to Tuxford WMC and Doncaster Branch Secretary Dave Gravel for passing on a copy of a clever scam letter.

The letter looks official and is headed "Publication of companies and VAT Registration Numbers in the UK Corporate Portal 2014." It goes on to say that changes to the EU economic package oblige all companies to provide their VAT registration number and includes a form to return to update the database.

In the small print at the bottom of the form, however, is a line that says the club is agreeing to pay "797 GBP" and to take an advertisement for three years. It's very easy to miss it and not realise that GBP stands for Great British Pounds so you are signing up to pay out nearly £800.

HMRC says: "We are aware of a dubious letter being received by VATregistered businesses. This is from a German company and claims that due to the EU Economic Package all companies must publish details of their VAT number. This is not true

"If you receive this letter do not respond. If you are in doubt when you receive documentation do not sign anything and do not hesitate to contact us."

The answer is 'yes'

Clubs issued with a Bingo Operating Licence (BOL) because they pay more than £2,000 a week in prizes have to make an annual return to the Gambling Commission.

The return form asks whether a contribution is made for research, education and treatment of problem gambling. Because the Union makes an annual contribution to the Responsible Gambling Trust clubs should answer this question "yes".

Be wary of how vou use CCTV

I have recently received a number of complaints from clubs who have caught staff on CCTV not ringing in sales and think they can simply dismiss them on the basis of the CCTV; they can but only if they follow the correct procedures.

Clubs can use CCTV images taken from cameras positioned on club property provided they demonstrate they have taken all steps possible to protect the personal information of anyone captured by the CCTV footage. To ensure you comply with the Data Protection Act (DPA) the CCTV Code of Practice and other

relevant legislation follow and document the procedure set out

- Acknowledge that the club does have CCTV in place, with appropriate signage. State that the function of the CCTV is to prevent crime and protect public safety. Remind the staff that the use of CCTV in disciplinary proceedings is referred to in their employment contract and the employee handbook.
- 2. State that the CCTV allegedly caught an employee committing a disciplinary offence (which may also be deemed to be a criminal act) in the course of their employment. The CCTV footage may also show images of other staff not involved in the offence/crime.
- 3. State that the club wishes to use the CCTV images in connection with the disciplinary proceedings against the staff members. The CCTV footage may also be made available to the
- State that the club recognises that the CCTV images contain personal information and therefore to comply with the DPA they cannot be disclosed or released. However, section 35(2) of the DPA exempts the CCTV images from the non-disclosure provisions of the DPA where they are used for the purposes of, or in connection with, legal proceedings.
- 5. State that in the opinion of the club the disciplinary proceedings constitute legal proceedings in the light of the alleged criminal activity, and therefore the proposed use of the images in connection with the disciplinary proceedings is exempt from the non-disclosure provisions of the
- 6. State that the staff member will be given a chance to view the CCTV images and to fully explain and/or challenge their content.
- 7. Where relevant, state that the club has investigated the possibility of obscuring the images of other staff members, and whether or not this was possible. The obscuring of the identity of persons not relevant to the alleged misconduct should be attempted before the CCTV footage is shown to the staff member.
- 8. State that circulation of the images will be restricted to those attending the disciplinary meeting and those attending are covered by confidentiality provisions.
 - Clubs should ensure that they document the above process within their meeting notes before release of the CCTV images, otherwise they will breach the DPA.





THE PUB THAT'S

Ponders End WMC is essentially a pub with a club concert room added to the back of it, so it's not surprising it has survived a tough spell by combining the best aspects of a club with those of a pub.

Enfield, the home of the Lee Enfield rifle, was once the industrial powerhouse of North London and workers used to physical labour could choose from around 20 clubs and a pub on each corner including 19 in South Street alone. The demise of heavy industry, the arrival of a Wetherspoons pub, and the influx of immigrants who don't drink alcohol, have all had a big effect and this club faced a crisis of its own at the height of the credit crunch six years ago when it needed to be refinanced with a loan from Carlsberg.

"We have had to be prepared to listen to members and to make a few changes," said Club Secretary Sean Belton. "One of the first things the Committee did was to launch a questionnaire to see what people would like done."

One of the results has been a more diverse range of entertainment – a recent hypnosis show discovered Sean had a talent for ballet dancing – and the club are finding that while Sunday night used to be their most successful

Metropolitan Branch evening for live entertainment, Secretary and Saturdays are proving popular as well National Executive thanks to the efforts of Entertainment Member John Baker, Secretary Rob Ginder. The club also does well by letting out its 150-seat member John Tabor concert room to members.

"There's always an impression that Committees can be stick-in-themuds" said Club President John Willmott. "We are very much open to trying new ideas, we all pitch in by helping with the bingo and when I'm having a drink I'm just a member like anybody else."

The changes steadied the ship and as more clubs and pubs in the area have fallen by the wayside, Ponders End has benefited. Most recently the club has acquired some sports teams and

as well as its crib team and two pool teams it now has five darts teams,

as well as its crib team and two pool teams it now has five darts teams, two on Monday, two on Wednesdays and even one on a Friday night. Apart from keeping the club busy in midweek this also gives visiting

teams the opportunity to see the club. "I've lost count of the number of people who've said to me that they've lived near here for years and this is the first time they've been in the club," said John. "I'm pleased to say that quite a few of them go on to join the club afterwards."

Other groups the club has attracted include a book club – whose members read the same book each fortnight and meet in the club to discuss it;

a martial arts club as well as trad jazz fans who come to fortnightly performances by Bill Freeman's Happy Jazz Band. The Committee are particularly keen to attract a football team as that brings in younger people to ensure the future.

It's the way that Sean himself got involved. He originally came to the club to play pool, then when the pool players wanted a voice, joined the Committee. Now as well as being Club Secretary he's the Branch Games Secretary.

As a club the members pull together as a community to help the likes of local children, disabled Adam Goates-Sanders, and cerebral palsy sufferer Harry Christie. Because three-year-old Harry needed £45,000 for an operation in the United States, the club held a darts marathon with teams playing from 45,000 to 1. It has also helped Barnardo's, Leukaemia and Children's Cancer Care and has even bought bugles for the Boys' Brigade.

The club came into existence in 1911 when the Ponders End Liberal &

Labour Club took over the Prince of Wales pub and the front of the club not only still looks like a traditional pub, the front bar has been arranged to be like a pub snug, and thanks to Steward Diane Drane has become widely known for its cask ale, winning five CAMRA awards in the last six years, and gaining the prized Cask Marque accreditation. While it's not unusual any more – except in the North East – for clubs to serve real ale Ponders End were ahead of the game here, thanks to Diane's late husband Michael, who sadly died 15 years ago at the age of 47.

"He had a total aversion to keg beer so he introduced us all to real ale and we've never looked back," she said. "Carlsberg provide us with a selection of guest ales through its Tapsters Choice programme and we have also regular suppliers like The Tring Brewery and Red Squirrel from Hertfordshire."

There would have been 20 pubs on South Street but the Two Brewers pub opposite the club was hit by a bomb during the Second World War with the loss of 20 lives. Trustee Cliff Short, now 86, a fireman at the time had the unenviable job of going into the rubble and has been one of the driving forces in recent moves to create a fitting memorial garden on the site.

Cliff also had the last word when interviewed by the local paper on the appeal of the club. "It's a real community that's here," he said. "You can leave your wallet on the bar and you know that when you get back from the toilet it's still be there."

Learn to love your computer


The course has been organised by Burnley & Pendle Branch Secretary Michael Woodvine and National Executive member Geoff Blakeley in conjunction with Blackburn College. It is aimed at clubs in the North West but is available to anyone who can get to the Saturn Centre near Junction 6 of the M65 and has been designed for those who find computers daunting.

"The demands made by official bodies mean it's now very difficult to run a club without being able to operate a computer," said Michael, "The course is an effort to bring club officials up to speed with the ever increasing demands made on them by Government agencies, suppliers and service providers such as the HMRC, FCA, licensing authorities, banks, insurance companies and breweries.

"I'm delighted that the Union have decided to help bridge that knowledge gap by commissioning this basic computer course, which is being offered at a subsidised rate of £35 to officials and members.

"It will make many tasks less intimidating and we hope that instead of paying an accountant to carry out some of these elementary jobs, you will gradually gain the confidence to tackle them in-house, and save money. The course will also show you some of the enjoyable aspects of computers like how to find interesting and entertaining stuff online by using search engines like Google."

Members Are you an avid Corner gardener?

Hello Club Members

Even in our funny old British climate of very

unpredictable weather, gardening should always be fun and getting out in the fresh air at any age, is definitely good for all of us. So here are some handy gardening tips to get you started.

Sometimes there is really no need to go to the local nursery or garden centres and have the expense of buying all those little biodegradable pots to start your seedlings. You can simply make a start by saving all those empty cardboard paper towel rolls or toilet paper rolls from your kitchen and bathrooms.

Cut the paper towel rolls into four sections and the toilet rolls into two pieces. Place them on a tray touching so they do not topple over. Use a tablespoon to carefully fill them with soil and sow your seeds. Remember to gently sprinkle water as needed and store in a dry place until ready to use.

By the time you are ready to plant, the cardboard should be soft enough to just bury in the ground. Be sure when you plant, to completely cover the cardboard. Soft cardboard milk or juice cartons are also perfect for making seed starters. Just cut off the top and punch holes in the bottom of the container and fill with some potting mix. Sow the seeds according to the instructions on the packet.

Feeding your plants is important and banana peels, like the fruit, are very rich in potassium. This is an important nutrient for any garden. The next time you eat a banana, save that peel. You can dry the peels, by laying them on a flat tray outside in a greenhouse or shed if you have one. Once dried, grind up the peel and add in with your mulch, to help give your young plants and seedlings nutrition for a healthy start.

Save those discarded ice cream, ice lolly or popsicle sticks your children or grandchildren will have after they visit the ice cream van. You can then use them to write the name of your plants with a permanent marker and they can be turned into great labels for herb gardens or planters.

Another use for those now forgotten and obsolete old computer mouse pads, they make great padding for your knees while gardening!



Record-breaker for a record-breaker

Former President Ken Needham has been honoured by the York Branch for his efforts in keeping it in the Guinness Book of Records. As Branch Education Secretary until his retirement last year Ken was organiser of the York CIU Quiz League, which started in 1946 and is recognised by the Guinness Book of Records as the world's oldest quiz league. At this year's knockout final and presentation night at the Tramways Club he was presented with a framed certificate from the Guinness Book of Records, six bottles of his favourite red wine and a limited edition print of a painting of another record-breaker, Sir Nigel Gresley's locomotive Mallard.

Mallard, which broke the world speed record in 1938, has particular significance for Ken as he worked at Sir Nigel's former workshop in Doncaster before moving to York in the 1970s. A member of Holgate WMC and Burnholme Social he joining the Branch Executive in 1984, and became Branch President in 2005.
