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A CHANCE FOR CLUBS TO HIT THE JACKPOT

The introduction of Machine Games Duty (MGD) offers clubs an opportunity to try out new gaming machines without having to risk any money up front.

The new tax is payable only on profits from machines and replaces the old flat rate Amusement Machine Licence Duty (AMLD). The cost of this had been increased regularly by successive governments and had reached the point where it was no longer viable for many clubs to have more than a couple of machines. In some cases the upfront charge of £2,500 plus the VAT and the rent payable to the supplier was more than the club was receiving from the machines. More and more clubs, however, are using the profit-sharing arrangement pioneered by the Union's recommended gaming machine suppliers Dransfields, which involves the club paying no rent to the supplier but instead sharing the machines' profits.

"The new system means clubs can install machines and have no upfront costs," says Dransfields Managing Director Chris Haley. "It's a great opportunity to try out a new machine for members with no risks involved at all."

In addition to this good news non-commercial private members'

clubs are able to have one Category B3A machine, with a top prize of £500 and with income exempt from MGD. The new rules should mean that clubs will once again be able to take up their full entitlement of three club gaming machines (of which one can be a B3A). Those clubs with quiz machines will need to be careful not to include any gaming content otherwise it will use up one of the club's quota of three machines. Clubs are reminded that if you have offered machines for play on premises not covered by an MGD registration you could be liable to a penalty if you do not have a reasonable excuse.

 Following a recent review, the Government has issued a consultation document proposing changes to stakes and prizes as follows:

Category B3A Machines: an increase in

the Maximum Stake Limit from £1 to £2. Maximum prize to remain at £500.

Category B4 Machines: an increase in Maximum Stake/Prize Limit from £1/£250 to £2/£400.

Category C Machines: an increase in Maximum Prize Limit to £100. Maximum Stake to remain £1.

The hero of Waterloo

The village of Blucher and its pit were founded in 1816 and named in honour of the Prussian Field Marshal Gebhard Blucher, who had helped the Duke of Wellington win the Battle of Waterloo the previous year. Most historians believe Napoleon would not have been defeated without the intervention of Blucher and his 50,000 Prussians and the Iron Duke himself described it as "a damned nice thing – the nearest run thing you ever saw in your life", usually paraphrased as "a damn close-run thing."

Blucher pit shut in 1956. The pit at nearby Walbottle, which had originally been sunk in 1740, was renamed Duke Pit.

The Northumberland Branch has a previous connection with Blucher Social Club as the club's long serving Club Secretary Ken Green was Branch Secretary in the late 80s and early 90s.



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The old joke used to be that the only way to stop crime was to nationalise it.

It seems hard to believe now but for more than 50 years drink was nationalised with the Government owning breweries and pubs. In an attempt to keep munitions workers reasonably sober beer became state controlled in 1916 in three areas: Carlisle and nearby Gretna, Cromarty Firth in northern Scotland, and Enfield in London.

The idea was that because the landlord was earning a wage from the state, he had no incentive to increase his profits by selling more beer to workers who were already the worse for wear. In fact, to stop the workers buying more beer than was strictly necessary, between 1916 and 1919, there was a "no treating" rule, meaning you could not buy beer in a round, and pubs were closed between 3pm and 6pm on weekdays and 2pm and 7pm on Sundays, a law that was never repealed until the 1980s.

DROP HAY

After the Second World War, the Labour Government tried to expand the "state management scheme" of beer to the new towns, including Newton Aycliffe and Peterlee in County Durham. In 1948 a Bill was put forward by the Home Secretary James Chuter Ede, which created a dilemma for one of his MPs, Sydney Lavers, a leading figure in the Federation Brewery and later its Chairman. Mr Lavers was certainly a man of action. As MP for Barnard Castle in County Durham he received a telegram from a farmer in Teesdale during the terrible winter of 1947 saying they had no hay, and he organised the air ministry to drop them some.

"The Fed" had started in 1919 as a cooperative brewery with the shareholders being the CIU clubs of Northumberland and Durham. It successfully supplied the working men's clubs of the North-East until it was bought by Scottish & Newcastle, now part of

When the Cabinet promoted darts

It has always been crucial for the Union to involve itself in national politics, arquably none more so than today, because alcohol and clubs have always attracted the interest of politicians.

For the last 30 years clubs have been represented by the All-Party Parliamentary Group of MPs, who have had some notable successes. In this feature we look at a time when the Government ran its own breweries and even tried to encourage people to play darts.

Heineken, in 2004. Mr Lavers' big idea was to Government beer, although he found the expand the brewery by building new working men's clubs.

When Labour proposed bringing state beer to Durham, Mr Lavers' dilemma was how could he support his party when it was introducing a rival to his brewery?

So he went to Carlisle to investigate and his findings have been recorded in Hansard. He said he was impressed by the quality of the

pubs rather dark.

"I should like the managers of the State scheme to come to Durham and see our working men's clubs, with their bright colour schemes and new plastic furniture," he said. He was also concerned that the state pubs had no facilities for dominoes or darts, presumably because dominoes encouraged gambling and darts were dangerous.

'PROLETARIAT'


Home Secretary Mr Chuter Ede for his part said he wished to promote darts. "It is not merely a game requiring great physical skill, but it is the one way I know of teaching the higher mathematics to the proletariat.

"When I think of the school records of some of these people who work out those subtraction sums so quickly, I am amazed at the value of this practical instruction."

Mr Lavers went on to complain that the Carlisle pubs did not allow music or singing. "I must tell the Home Secretary that if Durham is provided with a State-managed public house in which people are not allowed to sing, the experiment will not be a success," Even so, Mr Lavers joined Mr Chuter Ede in voting for the 1949 Licensing Act, which set aside millions of pounds for pubs to be built by the Government in the new towns

In 1952 the new Tory Government, however, led by Sir Winston Churchill, repealed the state control of pubs in new towns but it was not until 1971 that the Carlisle state brewery was denationalised and sold to Theakston's, like the Fed eventually becoming part of Scottish & Newcastle.

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Disabled employees need 'reasonable adjustments'

A key requirement of the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 was for employers - including clubs - to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate the needs of a disabled individual. This requirement is also part of the Equality Act 2010 and it means your club is required to think broadly of adjustments that could be made and to give the matter serious thought. The club can discuss possible adjustments with the disabled employee but cannot rely on the employee alone to think of adjustments. The requirement is to make "reasonable adjustments." "Reasonable" is considered with the size and resources of the club in mind

Reasonable adjustments might include:

- · making physical adjustments to the workplace
- · allocating some duties to another
- moving the disabled employee to another
- · altering the hours of work
- · moving the disabled employee to another place of work
- · allowing time off during working hours for treatment or rehabilitation
- · arranging training for the employee
- acquiring or modifying equipment
- · altering instructions or reference materials
- providing a reader or an interpreter
- providing supervision.

The Equality Act 2010 made it unlawful to issue pre-employment medical questionnaires before offering employment. Prior to offering an individual a job healthrelated questions can be asked only to:

- · help decide whether there is a need to make reasonable adjustments to the selection process
- help decide whether an applicant can carry out an essential part of the job
- · monitor diversity amongst applicants
- take positive action to help disabled
- · ensure that an individual has a disability where there is a genuine requirement to have a disability

Challenging "old-fashioned" thinking

- · Disability should not be confused with all long term illness, as disability can affect health in different ways.
- Disability should not be seen in a narrow way - for example, a very small percentage of people with disabilities are wheel chair users.
- Not all disabilities are obvious. More people acquire disabilities than are born with them. Disability affects people in different ways in different circumstances. The problems that arise may relate to the physical design of the environment they are in. However, problems may also relate to operational customs and practices at work, such as hours of work or time
- · The club image and reputation can be seriously damaged or enhanced by negative or positive experiences relating
- Mental health problems such as depression and anxiety affect a

- significant proportion of the population, and stress-related illness is increasing.
- It is possible to make simple changes to jobs and the way they are carried out in order successfully to employ someone with a physical or mental impairment or learning difficulty without serious cost or even at no cost at all.
- Good practice shows that there can be easy ways to recruit and retain talented people with disabilities, which can often bring more general benefits in other ways.
- Not everyone with a disability under the legal definition would see themselves as disabled and many disabled people fear disclosing such information for fear of being unfairly treated. Such apprehension is bad for everyone and businesses and clubs need to focus on building trust through honest and transparent ways of working which can build everyone's confidence. To be successful at managing disability clubs need to train all employees to behave responsibly and treat people with respect and dignity. Clubs also need to encourage Stewards to adopt a "can do" mind-set by providing them with information concerning good practice and legal obligations. Stewards may also need advice about open and respectful discussions with individuals to find out how reasonable adjustments can be made.

An action plan

- 1. Audit existing policies and practices.
- 2. Develop a revised good practice policy which complies with legal duties and ensure that this is communicated to everyone.
- 3. Clarify Stewards' and employee responsibilities.
- 4. Keep up to date with good practice and legal developments.
- 5. Network with other clubs interested in progress in diversity to share learning and ideas and keep up to date and ahead of your competitors.
- 6.Listen to your disabled employees and members to make sure you know about their needs and preferences and help ensure policies and practices are relevant and up to date.

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Your chance to claim some cash back from the taxman

The four main categories I have been working on recently where clubs can reclaim VAT are: Linneweber 1, Linneweber 2, cultural exemption and drinks given away

Linneweber 1

This refers to claims for VAT overpaid on clubs' gaming machines before 6 December 2005 after German woman Edith Linneweber won a successful case in the European Court of Justice. It was then taken up on behalf of clubs in this country by Chris Haley, Managing Director of the Union's recommended supplier Dransfields.

Many clubs submitted claims with the assistance of an advisory pack bought from the Union while others submitted their own claims. The vast majority have received a repayment of the overpaid tax plus interest but some clubs, however, failed to follow the correct procedures and HMRC are now rejecting requests for repayment to those clubs for a variety of reasons.

I have acted for approximately 70 clubs in this position and depending upon the reasoning behind HMRC's rejection I have successfully recovered money in more than 35% of the cases, with the remainder hinging upon case law that will be revealed shortly. I am happy to look at the paperwork for any club which has submitted claims but found HMRC have refused to pay.

The case law in this issue (HMRC v Rank Group Plc) is not yet settled, but it is hoped this will be resolved within the next six months. Until then HMRC are making repayments with the proviso that if they are successful they will reclaim them. I think the chances of them being successful are slim to non-existent, but as in any legal issue there can be no guaranteed certainty.

Linneweber 2

This hinges upon Rank being successful in their case (Linneweber 1) with HMRC and the issue and opportunity for clubs is the same – that gaming machines on which VAT has been declared (up to and including 31 January 2013) are so similar to other gaming machines (such as B3A machines) which do not attract VAT, that the user would consider they were using similar machines. On this basis the EU principle of fiscal neutrality is breached and VAT declared on

Steward stole £24,000

A steward who stole from a club which trusted him to collect and bank takings, stock the bar, pay staff and look after the accounts, has been given a suspended prison sentence.

Newcastle Crown Court was told the steward had worked at the club for 20 years and the Club Secretary considered him a personal friend. But when he started struggling with his personal finances the steward began helping himself to the club's money. By the time he came clean about the amount he had stolen, more than £24,000 was missing.

The court heard that in November 2010 the club became aware the steward was having financial problems and he was allowed to cashin some of his holiday pay. In April 2011 an audit revealed there was a shortfall in the banking of £1,095. The steward said he didn't know where the money was but he was given a disciplinary warning and repaid the cash.

During a further audit in November 2011 the club's paying-in book could not be found. The steward said he kept it at the Post Office but was told he must return it. Later that month he appeared at the door with the paying-in book and admitted he had taken more than

The Judge imposed a 12-month suspended sentence with 300 hours of unpaid work and a curfew.



Clubs continue to pay too much VAT to the tax authorities and there remain several opportunities to recover money from the Revenue & Customs (HMRC). other gaming machines should be repaid.

Claims are capped at four years but can still be submitted now. The longer the delay in submitting a claim, therefore, the lower the amount of repayment that can be requested.

Cultural Exemption

This is an idea I identified about two years ago as being appropriate for clubs that organise live "cultural entertainment of a musical or theatrical nature." In practice this means any live act where money is taken for entry and VAT paid. Recovery can be made for the past four years and there is a continuing saving to be made in that clubs need no longer declare VAT on such income.

Drinks given away

I've acted for about five clubs who had declared VAT on the retail value of drinks given to Committee members when attending Committee meetings. There is no legal requirement to do this and I have persuaded HMRC to repay them.

There is a four-year cap on repayments but I am currently pursuing HMRC on behalf of one club in the North East. In 1993 they were assessed for VAT which HMRC said should have been paid in preceding years. We are also claiming for VAT the club paid over 14 years as a result of HMRC's incorrect instruction. If this is successful the club will receive repayment in excess of £15,000.

The effect of generating exempt income means every club will have to calculate their exemption every VAT quarter. The basis of the calculation is to determine whether VAT costs incurred in generating exempt income exceed certain levels. If they do there are irrecoverable VAT costs but if they are not all VAT can be recovered. My experience, however, indicates that in only a few clubs will costs exceed the allowed limits.

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As I visit clubs around the country it is amazing how much variation there is in the quality of draught beer in different clubs. We do have clubs that have won prizes for offering first class beer presented in a first class manner but we also have clubs that we would never enter if it were not for being a visiting games team or a first time visitor. Not surprisingly, the odds are that the former are thriving and the latter are battling to stay alive.

The reality is that through the use of preferred suppliers sought out by the CIU, the aspiration to excellence can become a reality in every club in the CIU.

PERFECT PINT

Obviously, training of staff in the handling of all cask and keg beers is an essential part of providing the perfect pint. This is critical in the case of cask beers as they are live products continuing to work until drawn into the glass for consumption. Brewers all contend that they provide a perfect product and they are mostly right. The problems generally start after the draymen have left. Brewers have a vested interest in the quality of beer served and many offer free cellar management courses. It is in their interest as well as that of the club. The CIU recommends Heineken in the UK as a preferred brewer and would urge clubs to use their products and insist on cellar training for every cellar manager who has not been formally trained.

Every club should also approach its own supplier if that is not

used to be one of the most expensive suppliers of gas, but a phone call will probably surprise as to their current competitiveness. Cellar temperature is another problem frequently encountered. There is a narrow band of acceptable temperature, above and below which beer quality is compromised. To advise clubs to insist on modern cellar cooling systems would seem absolutely stupid simply on cost grounds. However, a chat with another CIUapproved supplier, Envtec Services Ltd, may surprise hugely. They are often able to provide finance through the Carbon Trust and as their advertisement opposite shows, the capital cost is quickly outweighed by energy savings all over the club, not just in the cellar.

BEER LINES

Proper cleaning of beer lines is of paramount importance. Many will argue that the steward knows best as the professional and that should in no way be ignored. Many stewards, however, have been very agreeably surprised by another approved CIU supplier, CellarBright. They offer a line cleaning service that has the potential to save stewards time on line cleaning and save a large amount of wastage, thus more than paying for itself. It is also vital that glasses are clean and not still warm.

Finally, the staff at the sharp end, serving our members, will either make or break all that has gone before. Pulling a pint correctly is the final step in providing that perfect pint. Pulled wrongly all the hard work gone before is down the drain. All bar staff should be formally trained by the Steward and not allowed to work alone until their effectiveness is proven in the Steward's eyes. It must not be forgotten that a real part of pulling the perfect pint is a smile and courteous behaviour towards the members.

The above may seem like some sort of mass advertisement. It is indeed a bringing together of information about many of our CIUapproved suppliers, but for the benefit of clubs rather than the suppliers.

What I hope it shows is that the CIU is giving every single club in the Union the tools to help itself aspire to and achieve excellence and thus a better chance of success.

DRANSFIELDS SHOW THE

The Union's recommended gaming machine suppliers Dransfields have been at the forefront in helping clubs through the introduction of Machine Games Duty (MGD).

As we report on Page 1, clubs are no longer required to declare Output VAT on their machine income and Amusement Machine Licence Duty (AMLD) has been abolished.

MGD is payable only on machine profits and its introduction is good news for clubs. Using the profit-sharing arrangement pioneered by Dransfields, where clubs pay no rent but instead share in the machine profits, clubs can now try out a new machine for members with no risk involved at all.

The new duty was introduced following a series of defeats for the HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) on the question of VAT on gaming and lottery machines, and in what became known as the Linneweber case (See Page 7) where Dransfields helped Union clubs to reclaim thousands of pounds.

The company has followed this through by working closely with the HMRC implementation team, producing its own Guide to MGD, which was issued with *Club Journal*, and with features on MGD, B3A machines and other opportunities on the revamped Dransfields website.

"We sent a copy of our Guide to every Union club — even ones that weren't our customers," said Managing Director Chris Haley. "It's been a very busy time helping clubs complete their MGD Registration, we've been sending our local Area Reps to district meetings and we've received 30 to 40 calls a day from clubs needing assistance. We've talked them through how to register and most said they found us more helpful than the HMRC helpline! "At least three guarters of our customers registered on time for

MGD and I think we can be relatively happy with that result. Our task now is to help our remaining customers get registered. Any that fail to do so will be charged penalties by HMRC so they must get it done as soon as possible."

The previous taxation regime had meant that despite gaming machines being thought of as a staple feature of clubs the upfront fixed cost of the licence had resulted in the Treasury effectively taking the first £2,500 that the machine earned. Taken together with VAT on the takings and machine rent payable to the supplier there was sometimes little left for the club.

It therefore was often a case of concentrating all machine income into one or two machines so that the licence fees were minimised. Many clubs also took the understandable decision to minimise their licence fees by installing machines with 5p stakes or pub-style machines with maximum £70 jackpots.

With the abolition of the licence fees clubs will once again be able to take up their full entitlement of three club gaming machines (one of which can be a Category B3A machine with income exempt from MGD).

Following the introduction of MGD the major quiz games designers are amending their software to include Category C/D games such as may be found in pubs. While these games will no doubt produce additional revenue, the inclusion of these games effectively means that the quiz machine will then use up one of a club's three machines entitlement. So, for example, if a club already has three gaming machines then they cannot have a quiz machine that includes Category C/D games. In these circumstances a club should ensure that their quiz machine does not include Category C/D games and only offers traditional quiz games.



Union in talks over Saltburn

It was reported in last month's issue that the Union's holiday and convalescent centre. Saltburn House, on the north Yorkshire coast closed on January 31.

The National Executive came to this decision because despite the best efforts of the Head Office

and Saltburn House staff it was felt that continued financial losses over a period of many years had made it impossible for the centre to remain open. Total losses in the years from 2008 to 2012 add up to £861,296.

The centre was built by Darlington industrialist Henry Pease as a private mansion soon after he founded the town of Saltburn in 1861. Legend has it that he saw a vision of a heavenly city reminiscent of the description of Jerusalem in the New Testament's Book of Revelation, and the "jewel streets" on the cliff top near Saltburn House - Coral, Garnet, Ruby, Emerald, Pearl, Diamond and Amber Streets - are said to be a legacy of this vision.

QUAKERS

The Peases were a Quaker family so the town had no pubs or clubs. By the time the Union bought the house, however, members could enjoy a drink next door at the Milton Street Club and in the 1990s the centre opened its own bar.

The 14 members of staff at Saltburn House have all received the redundancy pay they are entitled to, including pay in lieu of notice and statutory holidays.

The Union Executive and Head Office Manager Stephen Goulding are in talks with Redcar and Cleveland Borough Council and other business interests to explore potential commercial uses for the Saltburn House site.

Members will be updated of any significant developments in these discussions.


