ALL clubs have now received nomination papers for what promises to be the most interesting National Executive election for many years.

Delegates at last year's Conference in Blackpool voted to reduce the number of members of the National Executive by creating 12 electoral districts where there are currently 25. Where an electoral district has 200 clubs or more it elects two representatives so the NEC will reduce in number from 26 to 15.

This year each district will be shared between at least two Branches with some having voters from three or even four Branches.

The posts of President and Vice-President held by George Dawson and John Tobin will also be up for election. The winners will serve terms of two years.

The timetable for the election is as follows:

Nomination papers to clubs: 13th September.

Nominations papers to be returned: 12th October

Ballot papers to clubs: 9th November

Ballot papers to be returned: 13th December.

Count at Head Office to take place on 16th December

World Cup medal is coming home

A WINNERS' medal from what is regarded as football's first World Cup will be going on display at a County Durham social club.

West Auckland Working Men's Club already houses a replica of the Thomas Lipton Trophy, which was won by a team of miners from the village in 1909.

No one is quite sure why amateur team West Auckland FC was chosen to represent England but the team, mostly made up of miners, travelled to Italy and beat professional teams from Germany, Switzerland and Italy.

Juventus

Two years later they did it again beating Juventus 6-1 in the final and were awarded the trophy outright.

It is thought the players had the medals minted themselves to honour their achievement, but only three are thought to still exist. One owned by club captain Bob Jones belongs to the West Auckland club and one is in the National Football Museum.

The third medal was found in a box of football programmes bought at a car boot sale near Newcastle several years ago and was nearly thrown out several times. It was put up for auction last month and bought for £5,200 by three local businessmen, Robert Yorke, John Elliott and Rob Hill. They have decided to donate the medal to the football club, who in turn will lend it to West Auckland WMC.

Tea Magnate

The trophy, named after tea magnate Sir Thomas Lipton, who started the competition, has also had a chequered history. The football club itself sold the trophy to the landlady of a local pub but in 1960 the village raised the money to have it returned to the club. It was stolen from West Auckland WMC in 1994 but fortunately the club was insured and a replica was made.

The story was told in the TV film "The World Cup: A Captain's Tale" with Dennis Waterman playing Bob Jones.

Plans are also in place for a sculpture celebrating the World Cup victory and the village's mining heritage to be constructed on the village green outside the club.

Social learn to love the micro

THE North East – and particularly North East clubland – has long had a poor reputation with real ale drinkers. The recent boom in microbreweries, helped in part by a cut in duty by then Chancellor Gordon Brown, has meant, however, that there have been sightings of hand pumps north of the Tees

at clubs in such places as Hamsterley, Haltwhistle, Tynemouth and, most notably perhaps, at Wallsend Social Club, known as the Social Club.

Here Treasurer GRAHAM “SMIG” SMITH tells how the Tyneside club learned to love hand-pulled beer from its local microbreweries.

FOR years the club had always provided Tetley's Cask Ale, which was one of the reasons I used to frequent the establishment as it was one of the only outlets on Wallsend High Street to dispense real ale. In recent times, however, it did not appear to be of the quality of previous years and demand declined so that a nine-gallon cask was taking longer than normal to be consumed.

It was suggested in Committee that it be removed from the beer range but the Club Secretary, Terry Tunmore said it would be a shame to lose the hand pump altogether so we should look to see if we could retail real ale to sample demand. I being a CAMRA member was assigned to the case.

Within a couple of days, without contacting them, we had received lists from Molson Coors and Carlsberg which gave encouraging news if we wished to sell the product at a reasonable price. Letters were also initially sent to the Mordue and Hadrian & Border microbreweries on Tyneside.

We started off with Deuchars IPA from the national distributors with Tyneside Blonde from Hadrian, who were very interested in our venture. Sales went well with the following Timothy Taylor's Golden Best being all consumed on one Friday evening!

It was very encouraging bearing in mind that a lot of our members have drunk Stones and Worthington keg biters for a number of years but are now coming round to the variation and extra taste.

Since then Mordue Northumberland Blonde has proved very popular with everyone, with steward Joe Stewart going to the brewery in person, to pick up barrels when we have run short. In fact his past knowledge in the trade has proved very helpful. And we now have some barmaids with very well-developed biceps.

We were advised by “the nationals” that they would levy a weekly rent for use of the hand pump if we did not continue to sell their ranges of beers via it so we asked for it to be removed and installed two hand pumps instead.

The purpose of each pump has yet to be determined – whether it be one for a blonde and the other for a dark beer or one for a local brew and the other for a national. Basically we are just seeing what we can purchase within the cost range so we can retail it at a specific price and maintain our overall margin. We did have one beer that was an “acquired taste” to most but we have noted not to purchase further such brews in future.

We are looking particularly at the local breweries to peruse their seasonal ales as another source of variety. If members or guests visit the club we take on board their comments and suggestions and actively follow them up to see if we can provide what they have recommended.

Hopefully, now we have got it off the ground, we may be able to move to a further hand pump to satisfy further demand.

Club shows Alan who he really is

COMEDIAN Alan Carr found out a lot more about who he really is when he visited a social club on Tyneside.

The star caused quite a commotion when he visited Camperdown Social Club to trace his family tree for the TV show “Who Do You Think You Are?” and met up with many relations, some of whom he'd never met before. He also discovered more about his mining heritage as two of his direct ancestors died in the same accident at the nearby Burradon Colliery in 1860.

“He was here for nearly four hours,” said Club Secretary Tony Isbister. “And he was a really smashing guy. He was really approachable and friendly.”

Alan's father, Graham, was a professional footballer, who went on to manage Northampton Town and is now Chief Scout for Newcastle United. Among those Alan met at the club was former Newcastle player Ron Guthrie (above), who went on to win the FA Cup with Sunderland in 1973.

During his researches Alan also discovered his great-grandfather was a

World War One deserter and because the programme concentrated on this the eventual TV programme did not show his visit to the club. The BBC have, however, promised to send Tony the footage that was taken at the club.

A club with no beer

THE Union's smallest and, arguably, most unusual club is Padstow Institute in Cornwall, which has 30 members and no bar.

The club was built in 1883 by its Victorian founders, backed by the local squire as a place for the working men of the town to better themselves by education.

From the beginning, there was a library, a reading room and also a games room, which is still offering billiards and snooker to the members. The original billiard room is a real feature and is virtually unchanged in over 125 years. There are traditional long wooden benches with long boxes, (cue stores) as foot rests at each end of the room. The table is in

good order but retains the original Victorian narrow billiards pockets, not always welcome by outsiders when playing league matches.

A Listed Building it was highly prized because it was built in red brick from ship's ballasts rather than the usual stone.

The club, sometimes incorrectly known as the Men's Club, used to house the local library but still houses the Padstow Museum and on May Day is one of the two starting points for the 'Obby 'Oss Festival, which features two hobby horses who tour the town.

Membership is open to both men and women and most members

join either to play snooker or because they have a sense of heritage. With no bar the club derives its income from renting out its room for special events such as art exhibitions.

According to Club Steward Ray Seager, the club's diary can get quite full.

"On Mondays our resident folk club provides the entertainment and over the years we have welcomed stars of yesteryear like The Strawbs, Showaddywaddy and Alvin Stardust. As we only charge a nominal sum, the function room is usually packed on these kinds of nights.

"While we do have quite a number of younger members, we are

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
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WEEKEND SCHOOL SET FOR SALT BURN

TWO lively regional finals produced the last six teams to qualify for this year's Dransfields/CIU National Quiz Final.

CHECK YOUR SUMS AND TAKE TIME TO READ THE SMALL PRINT

THE UNION is finding more and more clubs are suffering because they are substantially underinsured or have not read the special terms of their policies.

It's harrowing enough to see your club suffer a fire or flood. Taking time to check your sums and read the small print can avoid the extra heartache of finding your insurance company doesn't pay out.

To avoid being underinsured, clubs must insure themselves for the "new for old" replacement value of their Buildings and Contents, as well as for the Business Interruption. You

should also ask if 12 months is sufficient to rebuild your club after a devastating fire? Our experience suggests it isn't.

Getting these sums insured or the Business Interruption indemnity period wrong can have a devastating effect on a club's ability to recover after a serious loss.

These relate to issues such as electrical testing programmes, security and alarm maintenance, kitchen extraction duct cleaning, the safe removal and disposal of combustible materials and fire extinguisher maintenance to name but a few.

Failure to adhere to these conditions can result in a claim being turned down by the insurers with disastrous conse-

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

NEW PARKS SOCIAL CLUB

THE Committee at New Parks Social Club have literally had a fight on their hands to keep their head above water in these difficult times.

That’s because the club’s most successful evenings are their twice-yearly charity boxing shows, organised by promoter Elvis Hopkins, when their 500-seater concert room is filled to capacity. “They involve a lot of hard work,” says Club Secretary Derek Berry. “But they are tremendously successful. The charities often make as much as £10,000 between them and the club can turn over £13,000 at the bar.”

Such a big room brings big overheads and the club do their best to keep it filled. Along with bingo on Tuesdays and Thursdays they stage live acts on a Saturday night and every Wednesday night the room is filled with a disco for the Leicester Disabled Society, organised by club member Darryl Dowling. The room fills up from 6.0 and by 8.0 there’s no room. “It’s a great thing,” says Derek. “They absolutely love it.”


On Fridays the concert room is usually hired out for members’ functions and the club hosts individual singers in the intimate surrounding of its lounge, which is smartly decorated in the style of a pub snug.

The club also has a smaller upstairs

function room and this has a place in club history; it was in this very room that local MP Patricia Hewitt, then the Health Secretary in the Labour Government, promised a meeting of Leicester’s clubs that the smoking ban would not be applied to clubs and pubs that did not supply food, or there would be a separate smoking room. She soon reneged on this promise and perhaps, not coincidentally, is no longer the MP for Leicester.

In contrast her predecessor Greville Janner remains highly thought of in the city as does his father Barnett, who was the much-respected MP before him; Barnett Janner officially opened the club, a fact celebrated by a plaque at the club’s front doors.

Some clubs in Leicester have suffered because of the influx of Asians in the 1960s – many of whom do not drink alcohol -- but the New Parks Estate was built in

the immediate postwar boom and the club itself opened in 1953. One of Leicester's largest postwar estates it has only two pubs for competition, one of which is about to close. And, of course, the club has the advantage over its rival pubs of being able to police who comes in.

The club is committed to playing its part in the community and the Committee work closely with local schools, helping out with prizes when necessary. They involve the police in the boxing nights and are always keen to have good relationships with them. As Derek puts it: "You never know when you are going to need them."

The club has also helped many local charities, including the LOROS hospice and The Leicester Ex-servicemen's Association also uses the club for two functions a year, one in the spring and one on Remembrance Sunday in November after they have laid a wreath at the city's War Memorial.

As with a lot of clubs games are vital to keeping them used during the week. The local variant of skittles is a nine-pin board which players toss "cheeses" at from behind a 10ft oche. The club plays host to



three mixed skittle teams and two ladies' skittle teams as well as a pool team and four darts teams, meaning that the games room is in use every night of the week. It also has a small golf society with 20 members playing at different courses.

The games room and bar also includes a tribute to former Secretary Craig Fletcher, who tragically died from septicaemia in 2003 ten years after becoming one of the country's youngest secretaries at 32. To mark his contribution to the club the Committee contacted local company Star Listings International and a star has now been named after Craig in the constellation Pegasus. The certificate and a picture of Craig hang in the bar. "We'll never forget Craig," says Derek, "He did a tremendous job at this club."

He also proved a hard act to follow but Derek was grateful to call on the advice of former Treasurer Ron Newrick, who had also worked as a Steward, and these days the team includes President Mick Keating and Treasurer Tony Cooper.

"There's no doubt that things are tougher now," says Derek. At one time coming to the club was the only socialising you could do. Now there are so many other forms of entertainment that you need to work hard as a team to stay afloat."

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club MANAGEMENT

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FOLLOW THE PROCEDURE OR PAY THE PENALTY

IN August we looked at dismissals, this month we are looking at the related issue of the club's disciplinary procedure. As well as being used in cases of misconduct the disciplinary system may be needed in relation to an employee's ability to carry out their job.

Some cases of misconduct may seem indefensible but the club must always follow the procedure recommended in the ACAS Code, as even if the case against an employee seems proven, they can still be deemed to have been treated unfairly if the correct procedures are not followed.

Disciplinary action should have three main stages:

- letter
- meeting
- appeal

In some cases a second meeting stage may be appropriate.

There must always be a full and fair investigation to determine the facts and to decide if further action is necessary. All records should be kept meticulously; it is important to lay a paper trail as this will be vital should a case be taken to an employment tribunal. Minutes of meetings, emails, attendance notes, notes of telephone calls, copies of correspondence must all be kept and filed.

Disciplinary meetings

All appropriate officials, especially club secretaries, should be trained and supported so that they are able to carry out disciplinary meetings with their team. The Union's employment law consultants and the club insurers should be contacted before starting any action to ensure cover in case of a tribunal if it is available. Both should be able to assist by providing advice on legislation and procedure.

You should:

- Ensure all the facts are investigated in advance (including consulting the individual's personal file for relevant information) and plan how the meeting is to be approached.
- Make sure the employee knows from the letter inviting them to the meeting why they have been asked to attend and that they have a right to have a companion present. An individual is entitled to be accompanied by a work colleague or trade union official at formal disciplinary and grievance

interviews. It would be good practice for a club also to offer this at any purely investigatory meeting. Clubs do not usually have to allow other companions (for example family members or lawyers) but may do so if they wish.

- Make sure the individual has reasonable notice, ideally more than 72 hours.
- Provide appropriate statements from people involved in advance of the meeting, together with any key information you intend to rely on.
- Make sure another member of management can be there to take detailed notes and help conduct the interview.
- Give the employee ample opportunity to put forward their side of the story and call any supporting witnesses. The club can also call witnesses, but they can only be in the room for the relevant part of the interview – not the whole meeting.
- Make use of adjournments: always take a break to consider and obtain any extra information you need before reaching your decision. Adjournments can be useful if things become heated

or people are upset during the interview.

- Keep an open mind and never pre-judge the outcome of the interview before hearing the employee's perspective.
- Deliver the decision (and give reasons, taking into account any mitigating circumstances), confirm review periods and ensure you give details of how to appeal.
- Confirm the decision in writing.

The question of an employee's ability to do the job may arise because they do not have adequate training, or are unable to do the work to a satisfactory standard for another reason. The procedure is the same but before invoking it the club must try to identify the reason and give appropriate support.

Where an individual is unable to do their job because of ill-health they should be dealt with sympathetically and offered support. However, unacceptable levels of absence could still result in disciplinary proceedings.

The club may decide to take no action, may dismiss the employee or

decide to give the employee a warning. The club's policy should outline exactly what warnings will be given, but normal practice is to have three warnings before dismissal:

- oral warning (ACAS no longer recommends this stage as part of a formal procedure) but, for cases of minor misconduct, this will often be a reasonable method to prevent a problem escalating.)
- first written warning/improvement notice
- final written warning.

You should specify a time limit after which warnings are disregarded. ACAS suggests six months for a first written warning and one year for a final warning. A warning may continue to be regarded for a longer period – provided you specify the timescale from the outset and it is reasonable.

Dismissal

There are officially five potentially fair reasons for dismissal.

- Capability or qualifications
- Conduct
- Illegality or contradiction of a statutory duty
- Redundancy
- "Some other substantial reason"

Grievance policy

Clubs need to be sure that any decision to dismiss an employee will be seen as "reasonable" by an employment tribunal. The club must follow the ACAS Code prior to any dismissal and also have been fair overall, for example by complying with internal procedures, treating employees consistently and carrying out a proper investigation.

It is essential that grievances from employees are treated in the same fair manner and all line and appropriate club officials must be familiar with their club's grievance procedure.

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CLUB MANAGEMENT

PUBWATCH: OUR CODES COME FIRST

THE UNION is aware of certain local Pubwatch schemes where cases of alleged misconduct are being dealt with in a way that overrides the disciplinary codes enshrined in the CIU model club rules.

The disciplinary process within a club is stated in the Licensing Act 2003, Section 182 of the guidance to police and local authorities which makes clear that "(clubs) operate under their codes of discipline and rules which are rigorously enforced" and when a club applies for its CPC it is legally required to submit a copy of its rules as part of the application package.

When the CPC is granted the licensing authority effectively accepts the validity of the club rules. A club's rulebook constitutes a binding contract between the club and a person admitted to membership. These binding rules include provision for due process if a member is accused of misconduct.

A Pubwatch panel can adjudicate on the alleged behaviour of a club member brought before it but that is a separate action.

Stick to your rules

CLUBS are reminded that they should only be serving alcohol to those who are members of the club or who are legally signed in.

We have reports of non-CIU clubs around the country who have fallen foul of local councils or police making spot checks.

Paying PPL AND PRS

WHENEVER you play a sound recording in public there are two separate licence fees that have to be paid.

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PRS ensures its 44,000 composer, songwriter and publisher members are paid royalties when their copyright music is performed or broadcast in public.

LAW QUIZ ANSWERS

Q1: Conduct that occurs outside the workplace can justify a dismissal. However, the conduct must be of particular relevance to the job in question.

In relation to criminal charges a club will still be required to conduct a full and thorough investigation which may include suspension of the employee. It is not necessary to refrain from any such action until the outcome of the criminal proceedings is known; indeed such a delay could render a potentially fair dismissal unfair. However, it is extremely important that a club carries out their own investigation. Some of the issues committees need to consider when contemplating dismissal in such circumstances are:

- Is there an express term in the contract or the disciplinary policy governing offences outside the workplace?
- What is the nature of the misconduct and does this have a bearing on the role performed by the employee?
- Will there be an effect on the reputation of the club?
- Does the incident involve or affect other employees?

An example of these points was the case of *The Post Office v Liddiard* [2001] EWCA Civ 940 (7 June 2001). The tribunal had found that the employer had unfairly dismissed a convicted football hooligan. However, the Court of Appeal

decided the tribunal had not considered the issue central to the case, namely whether the employee's conduct – which led The Post Office to believe that they had been brought into disrepute – was a sufficient reason for the dismissal.

Q2 An employee is entitled to take a companion to meetings in disciplinary and grievance procedures. The companion can sum up but cannot answer questions on their behalf. Their role is to provide support and to act as a witness to proceedings.

The right to a companion does not apply to informal discussions or investigatory meetings, although a club may choose to grant an employee's request to be accompanied at any meeting.

If the companion is a colleague, the club must give that person time off work to attend the hearing.

Q3: If an employment tribunal considers the club has not followed the Acas code of practice on disciplinary and grievance procedures they may adjust any awards made by up to 25 per cent for unreasonable failure to comply with any provision of the code.

More success on VAT claim

THE Union through its advisers Ian Spencer & Associates has had another success with claiming back VAT on automated lottery machines from the Revenue & Customs (HMRC) in what have become known as Linnewebber claims.

HMRC have until recently issued a blanket rejection of all "protective Linneweber claims" submitted in 2006 and 2007 where the claims were not quantified at the time the "protective claim" was submitted. Following representation from Ian Spencer & Associates this position appears to be shifting in that HMRC have now confirmed repayment of previously non-quantified claims.

The arguments used are complicated and often protracted but in essence revolve around HMRC's internal guid-

ance detailing that non-quantified claims should only be rejected after an agreed timescale for production of the quantified claim has expired. When added to the fact HMRC failed to mention the lack of quantification and to reject it on that basis, together with evidence that HMRC have allowed certain VAT-registered persons to quantify their claim several years after the initial submission it would seem that HMRC are taking a pragmatic approach and reconsidering (and repaying) such claims.

Letters

IN a recent Club Journal I highlighted the case of my club being asked for £18,000 HMRC knew was not enforceable almost from day one. They harried and threatened us for 18 months and only dropped the case when our representatives discovered what HMRC already knew. The response of HMRC was to apologise for any inconvenience caused. They did not say they would review all cases, if any, of a similar nature where they had demanded and received money under false pretences possibly from other clubs.

I also highlighted the fact that HMRC had not signed up to the banks' fast payment system for payment to be received by them on the same day we paid them. This meant that even though extra days were allowed for electronic payment, the money had to leave our bank account earlier than when paying by cheque. HMRC apologised for any inconvenience caused. Are they going to show the genuineness of the apology by signing up?

The HMRC statement said they only come down hard on the minority that deliberately flout the rules. My club pays PAYE/NHI regularly. We did not know HMRC had not registered for fast payments. Our payment landed two days late. We had a letter telling us we would be charged interest on all future late payments as a result of two days' lateness of one payment. We must have become one of the minority that deliberately flouted the law in their opinion!

Our clubs and our club members are at the mercy of HMRC that admits to wrongdoing but will not address putting things right.

I feel left with no option but to challenge a senior representative of HMRC to a public debate on whether HMRC is fit for purpose. They can name the time and the place and then maybe; just maybe; we will move to a position of mutual trust and respect from a position of big brother and the voiceless downtrodden.



100,000 'hits' will trigger debate PETITION LAUNCHED TO AMEND THE BAN

AN online petition has been started asking the Government to give clubs and pubs the chance to have a separate smoking room.

If more than 100,000 people back the petition by December then the Government is committed to have a Parliamentary debate on the issue. Although this is unlikely to change Government policy overnight it would go some way to offset the impression given by the national mainstream media that the smoking ban has overwhelming support, which is leading to suggestions for even more Draconian bans.

Although smoking remains legal a man who wanted to have all films where anybody smoked classed as X-certificate was given airtime and treated seriously by Radio 5 and in Ireland ASH is trying to stop people smoke in their own cars. The Union and SOPAC held a rally in Liverpool during the Labour Party Conference and this will be reported in our next issue.

While it is not true that there is provision for smoking in the Palace of Westminster (MPS thought it would be hypocritical) one place which does have a separate smoking room is Saltburn House, the Union's holiday and convalescent centre on the north Yorkshire coast.

Those members who support the Union's campaign to give clubs the choice of whether they wish to have a smoking room (with



properly regulated ventilation) should go to this link: <http://epetitions.direct.gov.uk/petitions/14103>

All members have to do is click on the site and those on Facebook then hit the petition button to register. If every member of the CIU who has an email address "hits" this site it could be the most successful petition ever.

It's vital to let the Government know that there is support for a relaxation of the smoking ban.

MILESTONE FOR THE MAESTRO OF MUSLEY

AT the start of the current turf flat racing campaign we predicted that Richard Fahey could well give Mark Johnston a run for his money in terms of ending the season as leading Northern trainer, and that prediction has come true. At the time of writing, Fahey leads his Middleham rival by 15 winners and almost £250,000 in prize-money.

Irish-born Fahey trains at Musley Bank Stables, a mile from the historic training centre of Malton in North Yorkshire, and

facilities there include more than 150 stables, an indoor school which is almost one furlong in circumference and

encompasses lines of stables and an automatic horse-walker, one of six, which have been built to serve the complex. Musley Bank also boasts an equine spa, more than 20 turn-out paddocks, grass and all-weather gallops and schooling grounds, with the whole site extending to 120 acres.

Fahey joined Yorkshire royalty when he married Leila Easterby – they are now amicably separated – making legendary trainer Peter Easterby his father-in-law and Tim Easterby his brother-in-law, and he began his career in racing as a jockey. He rode more than 100 winners before turning his hand to dealing in horses and running a livery yard.

Then in 1993 he was persuaded by friends to take out a trainer's licence, initially based at Manor Farm, Butterwick, near Malton, and the subsequent 18 years have seen Fahey's fortunes steadily progress.

A key moment came in 2000 when the trainer recorded a Royal Ascot success with

Superior Premium, ridden to victory in the Cork & Orrery Stakes by Johnnie Murtagh. Fahey was soon to be found in the flat trainers' "top 20" list, and success, based on hard work and keen horsemanship, has continued to come his way.

Last year was undoubtedly Richard Fahey's best year to date, as he recorded a remarkable 181 winners and broke through the £2 million prize money barrier for the first time. His stable jockey, Paul Hanagan,

was crowned champion jockey, and Fahey also landed his first Group 1 success. That came courtesy of two-

year-old Wootton Bassett in the Prix Jean-Luc Lagadere at Longchamp on Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe day.

No matter how skilful the trainer, he can only work with the horses at his disposal, which means that having the sort of loyal and enthusiastic band of owners with which Fahey is blessed is essential to keep the winners coming.

"Owners are the lifeblood of this game," he declares. "Training decent horses for people who are as enthusiastic and passionate as I am about racing, is what racing is all about, as far as I'm concerned. Nothing gives me more pleasure than seeing owners have winners."

Judging by his record to date, Fahey should gain much more pleasure during the seasons ahead, and being crowned leading Northern turf flat trainer when the season ends in a few weeks' time would be another important milestone for the maestro of Musley Bank.
