LUBS have received another boost with the news that the Union's recommended gaming machine supplier Dransfields has won its latest battle with the Revenue & Customs (HMRC). The latest Tribunal looked at tax on lottery machines over four periods - because the law changed three times - and ruled against HMRC in three of them.

Dransfields has been in a long running dispute with HMRC over automated lottery machines, known as Category B3A gaming machines. This stretches back over four years and has involved two separate Tax Tribunals.

The first Tribunal confirmed that

HMRC were wrong and Dransfields were correct in stating that the income from the machines is exempt from VAT as the proceeds of a lottery. The second Tribunal was over Licence Duty on the machines, and was complicated by the fact that the law changed three times in three years.

The Tribunal ruled on the four different periods as follows:

Period 1: July 10, 2003 to July 18, 2006 No AMLD required

Period 2 – July 19, 2006 to October 31, 2006 - No AMLD required

Period 3 – November 1, 2006 to July 20, 2009 – AMLD

Period 4 – July 21, 2009 onwards - No AMLD

Union takes smoking lobby to the Cavern

CLUB members can tell Labour MPs what they think about the smoking ban and other issues when the Union hosts a special event at the Cavern Club in Liverpool later this month.

The Union and the Save Our Pubs & Clubs campaign will host a reception during the Labour Party conference in the city on Tuesday, September 27. The reception will last from 6pm to 8.30pm and will feature live music from a Beatles tribute band and film from 1999 of Paul McCartney playing at the Cavern. The club where the early Beatles made nearly 300 appearances was rebuilt in the 1980s with many of the original bricks.

This month's event follows a successful reception at the House of Commons in June when three MPs - Greg Knight (Conservative), Roger Godsiff (Labour) and John Hemming (Lib Dem) - joined forces with the Union and Save Our Pubs & Clubs and called for an amendment to the public smoking ban.

Simon Clark, director of Save Our Pubs & Clubs and the smokers' group Forest, said: "We are delighted to be hosting this event with the Union. It is very important that we impress upon Labour MPs that clubs are private places and should have the option of introducing a separate, well-ventilated smoking room if that's what members want."

General Secretary Mick McGlasham said: "This event is further evidence that the Union is playing an active role in the political process. As well as smoking, we will also be addressing other areas of concern. I invite members from all over the country, but especially clubs in the North West, to come and join us and make sure that we get our message across."

To attend the event at the Cavern Club, members should register with Daniel Lee at Head Office on (020) 7226 0221 or email daniel.lee@wmciu.org. As soon as you have registered you will receive a formal invitation.

Entry is free and there will be free drinks during the reception followed by a cash bar. The Cavern Club is outside the conference area so you do not have to be a conference delegate to attend the event.

THE Government is considering a late night levy that would allow local licensing authorities to charge all premises open between midnight and 6am - supposedly to pay for policing the late night mayhem in our streets.

The Union has told the Government the absurdity of this as our clubs do not cause any of this trouble. We also know MPs gauge public feeling by the letters they get so let your local MP know. Reproduced on this page is a sample letter you can send to your MP.

MUSIC THREAT

PPL - which collects licences for recorded music – is proposing a big increase in charges, particularly for Specially Featured Entertainment (SFE).

All clubs will have received a consultation document asking for their views and the repercussions for clubs so make sure you do. The Union has also been in touch with Equity whose members will also be affected, especially those who use backing tracks.

[To local Member of Parliament]

Dear

We as the Committee of [insert name of club] operate under a Club Premises Certificate as a private members' club.

We are aware that legislation currently being debated in the House of Lords will enable licensing authorities to initiate a "Late Night Levy" which will result in an extra fee to be paid if we operate after the hours of midnight. This fee will contribute to the policing of our high streets in order to reduce crime and disorder and public nuisance created by alcohol-fuelled revellers.

We, as the Committee of a private members' club, regulate not only the activities of our club but also the conduct of our members. We are not situated on the high street and do not in any way contribute to the crime and disorder and public

Further, we understand that the local Licensing Authority will have the power to initiate Early Morning Alcohol Restriction Orders which would effectively ban the sale of alcohol in areas between the hours of midnight and 6am. For the reasons given above we believe that private members' clubs operating under a Club Premises Certificate should be exempt from such Orders, as we self-regulate the conduct of our members and are quick to ensure that disciplinary action is initiated against any member who may bring the club's good name into disrepute.

We urge you, therefore, to support our request to exempt private members' clubs operating with a Club Premises Certificate from both the Late Night Levy and the Early Morning Alcohol Restriction Orders.

We look forward to hearing from you and your confirmation of interest in supporting the differentiation of private members' clubs from the high street late-night alcohol-fuelled crime and disorder and public nuisance.





DARTFORD Working Men's Club has won national awards for its beer and for its folk music but there's much more to it than that.

The club is one of the oldest in the Union and has just celebrated its quasquicentenary - its 125th anniversary - but it's also one of the most modern with its own radio station, Italian coffee on offer and members being kept up to date with special events by text message. The club's earliest minutes show that its first President was E. Hesketh Esq., with J.L.Spoor Esq. as important Mr W Heavisides as club's centenary in 1986. Secretary. Two years later mem-

bers of the club founded Dartford Football Club, one of the founder members of the Southern League, which has included former England manager Peter Taylor among its managers and is currently two leagues below the Football League in Blue Square Bet League South. The Dartford Club Association Limited, as it was then known, became the Dartford Working Men's Club in 1890 when it moved into Westgate House, a mansion built by John Hall, the founder of a local engineering company. A picture with children at the railings outside the old club is part of the local studies collection at Dartford Library and can be seen on a display board in the street nearby as part of the Dartford Heritage Trail.

The archives also show Westgate House was visited by the Prince of Wales, later Edward VIII in 1928, and that he danced with two local girls Ivy Bentley and Gay Nesbitt. The club was eventually forced to move to make way for redevelopment and the current purpose-built premises were opened in 1959.

Website: www.dar Its success as a real ale club started in 1999 when Steward Nick Byram persuaded the Committee to allow him to give one real ale a try on the bar. The combination of tasty ale at club prices proved irresistible and more and more handpumps were introduced and more ales found from all parts of the country. As word spread visitors also came from distant parts, particularly after the club was declared as its Club of the Year by CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale) in 2006. Now the club often has as many as 15 handpumps on the bar and 100 ninegallon casks of ale in its back yard.

"Credit goes to the Committee, who were prepared to give it a go," said Nick "We've found that once people get the taste for it they just don't go back to keg."

Club President Peter Sands thinks the club's staff are also a big factor in its success.

TAKE ADVICE BEFORE YOUR CLUB HAS TO BE WOUND UP

IF your club is wound up the Committee will certainly face condemnation and criticism but they also risk legal action and even losing their own money. It's vital, therefore, to have proper legal, accounting and taxation advice as soon as possible from a licensed insolvency practitioner to make sure the Committee and sometimes the members avoid pitfalls and protect themselves.

A decision to close the club will involve the Committee in following the complex legal requirements for "winding-up" or liquidation. Ultimately the club will cease to trade and the assets will be sold to pay creditors. The decision to wind up the club is not made by the Committee and it will be necessary to arrange for a meeting of the members to resolve that the club should be wound up. The Committee should always be aware that their duty is to safeguard the assets of the club for the benefit of the members.

As part of the process of winding up there will be detailed consideration of several matters including:

- · staff redundancies;
- steward's accommodation issues;
- club premises security;
- insurances;
- dealing with loan creditors;
- informing and arranging to pay suppli-
- placing the club up for sale;
- selling and collecting the club's other
- encashing investments;

NMW is reviewed

THE UNION has been asked to give its views on the National Minimum Wage (NMW) to assist the Low Pav Commission to prepare recommendations for the Government.

The main issues to be discussed will be:

- The levels for the minimum wage from October 2012;
- Whether the minimum wage regulations could be simplified;
- Whether business could be given greater clarity on future levels of the minimum wage, including the option of two-vear recommendations; and
- Whether any other recommendations from the Low Pay Commission could be introduced more promptly. The Commission has also asked for comments on the level and impact of the NMW on small businesses in comparison to other pressures they



- dealing with corporation tax matters (including the potential capital gains on the subsequent sale of the club premises);
- dealing with VAT and PAYE liabilities;
- retention of the club's books and accounting records. It will also be important to make sure that the club has up-to-date accounts and has full listings of its assets and its liabilities. All of these require considerable legal skills and expert knowledge which is not usually possessed within the Committee.

INSOLVENCY

The Insolvency Act 1986 defines insolvency as the "inability to pay debts". This arises when the value of the club's assets is less than its liabilities. If a club finds itself in this situation then the Committee have to make important decisions with possible serious consequences.

The first decision is whether to continue in business with the aim of becoming solvent again if cash flow improves. This question cannot be answered by wishful thinking and calculations on a piece of scrap paper. There should be a careful assessment by professionals of the prosUNION Auditor BILL ROBINSON explains why Committees need to take professional advice as soon as a club is in danger of going under.

pects of success leading to a defensible conclusion in the event that the club decide to carry on trading. If it is not reasonable to continue then liquidation is required or some other re-structuring idea developed.

The decision whether to continue needs the following questions considered:

• Is the club a registered Industrial & Provident Society or a Friendly Society? An Industrial & Provident Society club will have the word "Limited" after its name this indicating that the members

have limited their personal liability to be sued to the value of their individual share in the club. The Friendly Society club has no such word at the end of its name and the members therefore have unlimited liability (jointly and severally) for the debts of the club. Most CIU clubs have had the good sense to become Industrial & Provident Societies.

• Is there a detailed cash flow and balance sheet forecast prepared which demonstrates the club can establish a surplus of assets over liabilities? Lenders might ask for security and for trading agreements be aware that trading agreements might hamper the club's ability to create positive cash flows. Lenders might also ask the Committee or members for personal security or for personal guarantees. Security on members' personal assets and

personal guarantees should be avoided. This is putting members' assets at risk. Members might be willing to lend their personal money to the club – do not borrow from them more money than they can afford to lose.

• Can the club sell assets which are sur-

plus to requirements? These will generate cash flow but if the asset in question is property be aware of potential tax on capital gains.

Do the members want the club to continue? If they do they must be fully informed of the current financial position and risks.

SOLVENCY

If the eventual value of the assets exceeds the value of the liabilities and as a result there is "money in the bank" at the end it is appropriate to consider whether these excess funds could and should be distributed to the members.

This begs the question: who are the members? Are they the ones who have paid

their subscriptions up to date? Is there a proper register of members? Has there been a recent increase in members because of a rumour that the club is going to close and members will receive a "pay-out" (distribution)? What happens to life and honorary members?

These matters require detailed legal knowledge of the Industrial and Provident Societies Acts and the Friendly Societies Acts as well as what is written in the club's Rule Book.

THE FINAL ACT

"Winding up" or liquidation is the death of the club. The club ceases to trade and the assets are sold to pay creditors. Members can put the club into liquidation. If insolvent the creditors can appoint the liquidator (creditors' voluntary liquidation). Any creditor or a group of creditors can ask the court to wind-up a club (compulsory winding-up). A creditor with a floating charge over all the assets can sometimes appoint an "administrative receiver".

To protect the club, the members, the Secretary and the Committee always get advice at an early stage. Your local Branch will be able to help you find an appropriate licensed Insolvency Practitioner and in most cases they will offer a free initial consultation.

Machine tax win

In a written judgement the judge criticised HMRC and clearly wanted to decide in the taxpayer's favour on Period 3 as well. He

found for HMRC with "...considerable reluctance, as it seems...to be an unfair and capricious interpretation" and said he considered it to be a drafting error in law that he was unable to correct.

What this means in practice is that any club that did not have a licence between November 1, 2006 and July 20, 2009 may be required to purchase a Default Licence but as there is a three-year cap after which HMRC cannot issue a Default Licence, Dransfields' understanding is that a club can only be assessed from August 2008 to July 2009.

Dransfields Managing Director Chris Haley told *Club Journal*: "This is a good result for clubs and shows that we were correct in our interpretation of the VAT Act and the Betting and Gaming Duties Act and that HMRC just got it wrong. The complexity of the law and the fact that the definitions of machines were changed three times made it extremely difficult for any taxpayer to keep abreast of legislation and stay on the right side of the law. "Dransfields has always been determined to protect clubs from threatened retrospective taxation on these machines and it is an enormous relief to clubs to know that this threat has now been lifted. Those clubs that were supplied with a B3A by Dransfields were licensed with effect from 1 September 2007 and we are assisting our customers in dealing with any liability prior to that.

Those clubs that had a B3A machine between November 1, 2006 and July 20, 2009 and did not pay licence duty may be required to do so but we think only from August 2008.

"After four years of battling with HMRC, the end result is that we are back where we started and that is with the B3A machine exempt from VAT and with no licence duty payable. Any club that has not yet reclaimed the VAT paid on their B3A machine income should do so as soon as possible

We have been informed that HM Revenue and Customs are in the process of drawing up a new Business Brief on the matter and that this will be published within the next few weeks"

DALGLEISH AIMS TO KEEP **20 PER CENT STRIKE RATE**

TALKING RACING

ONE of the rising stars of the Flat training world is 28-year-old Keith Dalgleish, who was only granted a licence to train in February. By early August he had recorded 21 winners from 106 runners, making for a remarkably healthy 20 per cent strike rate. A £1 level stake bet on each of Dalgleish's charges would have yielded a welcome £33.88 to date.

Dalgleish was born at Hawick in the Scottish Bor-

ders and made his name in Yorkshire as a notably talented Flat jockey, being closely associated with fellow Scot Mark Johnston. During his career in the saddle he rode 285 winners, including

two at Royal Ascot and a Group One event in Germany aboard Yavana's Pace. He is also credited with partnering the celebrated mare Attraction in the first two wins of her illustrious career with Mark Johnston.

However, by the age of 21 he had been forced to give up his riding career due to increasing weight, and made his first significant step towards a career as a trainer when he was appointed Head Lad to Noel Wilson at Belstane Stables in Lanarkshire.

Belstane Stables is an extremely well equipped 50box yard, but owner Gordon McDowall does not exactly give his trainers the chance to earn any long service

awards. Wilson's appointment was the fifth change of name on the licence in three years, with Ian Semple, Linda Perratt, Semple again, Wilson and Val Donoghue each enjoying varying degrees of success in the

Dalgleish's promotion to the top job at Belstane early this year will be widely regarded in the racing world as something of a poisoned chalice, but hopefully the statistics he has posted to date will be enough to keep even the most demanding of bosses happy.

> High spots to date include the successes of prolific sprint handicap winner Doc Hay and the performances of Stonefield Flyer, who came close to providing Dalgleish with a dream Royal

Ascot win in his first season back in June, following a six-length winner at Newcastle on his previous outing. The two-year-old sprinter was just pipped at the post in the Windsor Castle Stakes by Frederick Engels, before going on to score at Doncaster at odds of 1/4 on his next outing.

Such a narrow defeat at Royal Ascot may have been a disappointment for Keith Dalgleish, but this dynamic young trainer will surely be back in Berkshire for the Royal Meeting again next year, as well as gracing many other high class venues as his burgeoning career goes from strength to strength.



"We feel, however, that the main problem is that the competition leaflet does not reach the notice board in many clubs therefore potential interest is not found. Some golfers have also stated that clubs can no longer afford to pay their members' entrance fees and therefore do not give the golfer the opportunity to pay his own entrance fee (normally about half the course green fee).

"It's very sad. People really need to support their Branch competitions to ensure the Union's recreation activities continue."


