CLUBS ARE THE KEY TO COMBATING LONELINESS

The importance of socialising among the elderly has been recognised by a new campaign using £70m of National Lottery cash.

Studies have shown that belonging to a club, defined in the widest sense as a group that meets at least once a month, is as good for your health as doubling your income or giving up smoking. The research also concluded that loneliness is more dangerous than obesity and that It has significant links to a range of chronic conditions, including hypertension, depression, and dementia – increasing the risk of developing Alzheimer's disease by 50%.

The Big Lottery Fund's Fulfilling Lives: Ageing Better campaign has teamed up with the Daily Mail newspaper to hand out cash to worthy projects, and has decided to concentrate on 32 local authority areas.

The Fund will concentrate on larger projects that are likely to be beyond the scope of clubs but a spokesman said the Lottery welcomed applications for small scale funding for such projects as pensioners' afternoon clubs.

"Our Awards for All programme gives groups a quick and easy way to get small Lottery grants of between £300 and £10,000.

"We want to fund projects which address the issues, needs and aspirations of local communities and people.

"We will fund a wide range of community projects aimed at developing skills, improving health, revitalising the local environment and enabling people to become more active citizens."

"We are both trying to build up the community as we have very similar aims," said Martijn. "Andy is interested in the social side of things and I am concerned about people's spiritual direction."

Andy, also known as Jud, has previously been featured in *Club Journal* running the club's Vespa scooter club, and combined the roles of steward and secretary earlier this year to become club manager. He is also a volunteer for the community charity Toc H and was recognised for his work this summer earlier this year by being invited with his wife Christine to a Buckingham Palace garden party.

Dear Sir.

In reply to Phil Johnson from Smokers' Justice I would say that the smoking ban may have affected our trade and, yes, there are valid libertarian values that have been ridden over roughshod but the overriding problem that is crippling our trade is public access to cheap alcohol. We simply cannot compete with supermarkets and other discounters who often use alcohol as a loss leader to attract shoppers to their stores.

The scrapping of the beer duty escalator is welcome but has little benefit to clubs and pubs, and the recent Government initiative to ban retailers from selling alcohol below cost price will not be enough as the supermarkets and discounters will find a way round this.

The solution? We need to keep putting pressure on the Government to reconsider their Barry Reay recent decision not to implement Cross Hills SC a minimum alcohol unit price. A

minimum unit price of at least 60p will have a meaningful impact on cheap supermarket alcohol, while having no effect on club and pub prices and will bring some long overdue fairness. The Government would benefit too, as their VAT take would increase from the supermarkets and discounters.

Secondly, the Government is guilty of gross irresponsibility in not taking positive action to resolve the undoubted link between cheap supermarket alcohol and the increase in alcohol-related crime unsociable behaviour. This irresponsibility even goes so far to suggest that it is in breach of its own licensing law objectives. Clubs and pubs will continue to close until we get a fair minimum unit price of alcohol imposed by

Model society helps to keep social club on track

A club in Kent has gained more than 50 new members after a model railway society took on a whole floor in its premises.

The Erith Model Railway Society marked its 50th anniversary by moving to Belvedere WMC in October, with all its members receiving their 2013 Pass Cards together in December. Building work ended in February and this summer has seen the Society firmly established at the club with its own lounge and "library" area and the rest of the ground floor given over to test tracks, and layouts for testing, running and repairing them.

Both parties have gained: The Society has new clubrooms and CIU membership, and the club has more than 50 new members and Pass Card holders. "When we extended the club over the car park we were left with what was effectively dead space," said Club Secretary Jeff Bagnall. "This has been a great solution for everyone and now it looks really good down there."

The Society meets on Wednesday nights and its members are delighted with the new arrangement as, says its Chairman Peter Kilner: "We are in the enviable position of not having to share our facilities with anybody else, so the rooms are available every day of the week for members to work on layouts."

WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR

The Society's subscriptions include the price of a subscription to the social club and, appropriately, while the club is in Invicta House, the Society's emblem is the locomotive Invicta, named after the county's Latin motto, which is thought to celebrate William the Conqueror's decision to bypass Kent on his way from Hastings to London, leaving the county unconquered — or invicta.

The Model Railway Club was founded in June 1962 and, its first clubrooms were in a Methodist Church Hall in Erith that was hired for certain evenings for members to socialise (but not drink, obviously) and build layouts. This sort of arrangement is typical but meant members lacked a permanent base from which they could do work at any time of the week. After using rooms in a couple of pubs, the club met for about 20 years in Norvic House, a block of flats in Erith until it was recently demolished.

The Society had originally decided to move to the Belvedere Community Centre but one of the members, Laurie Mullett was

also a member of the Belvedere WMC, and suggested the club. The move meant the Society's members all joining the club. More than 50 people were inducted en masse on October 17 and later received CIU Associate and Pass Cards on December 12.

The move was done stages: everything was moved lock, stock and barrel and stored separately new clubrooms, which are underneath the bar, lounge and function room but level with the car park. Building work finished February allowing members to start moving layouts, worktops and other furniture into the new clubrooms.

"Our main purpose," says

club member Michael Chipperfield, "is not just to play trains and to socialise, but to build and exhibit layouts that can depict virtually anything the modeller wishes. It can be based on a real place and set during a certain period, or it can be totally fictitious. "Our

layouts show trains running in the countryside, the commuter belt, villages, towns, junctions, depots, terminuses, and even the logging industry. Your imagination is the limit in what could be described as a form of art."

Completed layouts - if layouts are ever completed as they're

always being added to — are usually displayed at an exhibition and the next exhibitions will be held at Huxtable & Scout Halls in Bexleyheath on September 20 and 21; and at St. Michael's & All Angels Church in Wilmington on Saturday, October 12 and Sunday, October 13. Alternatively enthusiasts are always welcome to visit the Society's rooms at the club.

YOU STILL MUST BEWARE TRIBUNALS

Committee may be liable

THOUSANDS of members of grass roots sports and social clubs have been warned they could be liable to pay back huge debts if their clubs fold.

It comes after the Football Association said as many as 200 members of AFC Totton near Southampton may be held responsible for the £185,000 bills its committee ran up in the past two years.

Shocked members have said they were kept in the dark about the club's finances and are now doubly dismayed by the liability threat if a solution cannot be found.

This can also affect Committee members at clubs that are constituted as Friendly Societies under the joint and severally rule and the Union's advice is to re-register your club as an Industrial & Provident Society. The Rules Department at Head Office can tell vou how.

11-year wait... for £20

Former members of a non-Union club are due a windfall 11 years after it closed - but they needn't hold their breath as they could end up with less than £20 each.

A High Court hearing in London last month finally wound up Gloucester WMC freeing up £30,000 that has been sitting in a solicitor's account. It can now be split between members but administration expenses have to come off the sum, and around 180 people are already claiming a share of the money.

Even if expenses are low, and nobody else comes forward, it's estimated that this would still only give each member less than £20, something to be kept in mind if there's a vote to wind up your club.

Two years for club thief

A former bank manager, who stole £135,000 from a trusting Committee in the Midlands, has been jailed for two years after admitting taking money from the club between 2010 and 2012.

As previously reported members became suspicious when the Secretary kept delaying the annual general meeting, where he was due to give details of the accounts.

The club's new secretary has estimated the total loss to the club as being in excess of £300,000 and says forthcoming events planned to start recouping the money include a ladies' night, cabaret and a number of concerts.

The introduction of Employment Tribunal fees for claimants means clubs may unwittingly

adopt a less cautious approach to weak claims to the Employment Tribunal. They should not, however, avoid the need for sound employment practices.

New fees introduced at the end of July mean staff seeking to make a claim against a club through the Employment Tribunal service will face substantial two-stage fees. They will need to pay initially when submitting a claim and once more if they wish their case to proceed to a hearing. The costs are:

- Type A, which covers most basic claims, for example, claims for non-payment of wages or a redundancy payment. The issue fee is £160 plus a hearing fee of £230.
- Type B, which covers more complicated claims such as unfair dismissal and unlawful discrimination. The issue fee for this sort of claim is £250 and £950 to go on to a hearing.

EMPLOYER FEES

Tribunal fees are most usually paid by employees; clubs submitting a form ET3 in response to a claim do so without any cost. However, specific fees have been introduced for employers; it will cost £350 to submit an appeal against a Tribunal decision or £600 for judicial mediation in an attempt to settle a case prior to progressing to a

The annual number of claims being lodged with the Employment Tribunal service is around 186,000 or more than 3,500 each week. The hope is that with the introduction of fees for claimants, the Government and employers will see a substantial reduction of this figure. Without doubt, some employees will be discouraged in making a claim by having to pay a fee.

The significance of this may not, however, be as great as first thought. The fact is that a sizeable percentage of employees will avoid having to pay the fees themselves. The fees will be waived for those employees who are truly unable to be able to afford them this will apply to claimants who either receive specific benefits or are on a low income.

TRADE UNIONS

Public statements by trade unions declaring that they will be paying the fees on behalf of their members have added to the list and are another factor regarding Tribunal fees. Many claimants also have the benefit of legal expenses insurance contained within their home contents policy.

It would be naïve for clubs to believe that the threat of employees submitting a claim against them has significantly diminished. Clubs must not take a less cautious approach in their behaviour towards employees. It is absolutely crucial that clubs should continue to follow professional employment practices which comply with their statutory and contractual obligations and the current Acas Codes of Practice.

In reality the only practical way is to avoid the need for staff to make a claim to a Tribunal in the first place. In the past seven years only one of my retained clients has had a claim made against them at the Tribunal. Unfortunately, this was one that was out of my control from the outset.



WHAT MAKES A GOOD SECRETARY?

Burnley & Pendle Branch Secretary MICHAEL WOODVINE, who is pictured on this page at a presentation at Nelson Carters' & Motormen's Club, where he is also Club Secretary, has written this guide to the duties of a Club Secretary.

The position of Club Secretary is critical to the successful management of any club.

The Club Secretary is the key administrator and Executive Officer of the club. He/she should provide the link between members, the club's Management Committee, staff and outside agencies.

A Secretary must be enthusiastic with a good knowledge of club administration systems and have decent people skills. They need to be a good communicator, both verbally and in writing and have excellent organisation skills, including minute taking and book keeping. They should also have sound managerial abilities, be able to maintain confidentiality and be able to work in partnership with others, both within and from outside the club.

The main requirements of the post are:

- To know and understand the Club Rules, Bye Laws and Statutory Law as it relates to the club.
- 2. To attend meetings and record minutes, take instruction from the Committee and advise them on any issues regarding 1 above.
- Compiling the Cash Book and Statement of Accounts.
 Overseeing other financial records, which may include the
 Treasurer's Book, Bar Book, Bank Statements and monitoring
 other financial activity, presenting information as required to
 the Finance Committee and Management Committee.
- 4. Preparing staff wages and submitting Real Time Information (RTI) in line with Revenue & Customs (HMRC) requirements and Annual Tax returns.
- Attending to all club correspondence after presenting it to the Club Committee and acting on their instruction and behalf in all matters.
- On the Committee's behalf /instruction, managing club staff and communicating effectively with them, assisting with discipline and recruitment as required.
- The ability to use a computer for electronic transfer of information such as RTI, online banking, tax returns and emails, and to store and record information.
- The ability to deal with goods and service suppliers, breweries, contractors and government agents and representing the Committee as their Executive Officer, in all matters arising between Committee meetings.

POLITICS

The hours of work will vary but a clear commitment to the club and its members, the Management Committee and the staff will keep you busy (some days more than others!) Some of the work can be carried out remotely from the club but attendance is required for meetings, supervision of staff and contractors etc. and to ensure that you have a correct "feel" for how things are at the club.

Remuneration is usually determined by club committees or members at general meetings, as prescribed in the club rule book and can be by way of honoraria, salary or weekly wage, or of course as a volunteer. It is subject to normal deductions, (tax and National Insurance), and not usually based on an hourly rate but paid as an annual amount. A good knowledge of "club life and politics" is imperative. So if you are considering taking up a position as a Club Secretary... be prepared and good luck!

COMBINING THE BEST OF THE OLI



The old and the new combine perfectly in a surprising way at this Welsh club – in more ways than one.

The club is situated on the edge of the old pit village of Pontnewydd, which has been successfully absorbed into the new town of Cwmbran; new Club Secretary Adrian Byard has recently taken over from long-serving Clive Hills, now Club Treasurer, and the club has moved from its 1920s base into a new purpose-built building, which has a surprise in store.

The club entrance hall looks like any other and includes framed pictures of its original committee from 1927 and a Victoria Cross winner from the 19th Century. But upstairs is pure 21st century as the club's lounge has been transformed with conservatory furniture and red flowery curtains into what could be a verandah in the colonies. Doors lead out from there to a rooftop terrace where members have been able to enjoy what has been a glorious summer.

"When the sun is out there's nowhere better," says Adrian. "We're very pleased with the lounge. We decided to hand over the choice of décor to our women's committee and they've made a great job of it." As well as the upstairs lounge the women's committee have created one of clubland's most striking concert rooms and have even organised the décor in the club's toilets.

The women's section was started eight years

ago and helps the main club committee by regularly organising family nights and charity nights for such causes as Help for Heroes. "They're aimed at everybody in the community," says Clive. "We're particularly keen to attract younger people so children can come in on family nights and stay till nine and 16 and 17-year-olds are always welcome if accompanied."

The advantages of a club that's attractive to women are obvious and, of course, where a club can attract younger women, young men will follow.

A different kind of sport also brings in younger members with the club having two darts teams, two snooker teams and two pool teams, while new members have also been attracted after attending functions in its 240-seater concert room, mainly on Friday nights as the club still has live music on Saturdays and Sundays and bingo on Thursday evenings.

Dancing is a big draw earlier in the week with line dancing on Mondays, zumba on Tuesdays and even belly dancing classes on a Wednesday.

A photograph and a painting of one of the area's most famous sons hangs in the club's hallway. John Fielding Williams from Llantaman won the Victoria Cross at the 1879 Battle of Rorke's Drift in 1879, the subject of the film "Zulu". Fielding, who also has a local pub named after him, changed

his name to Williams because he was under 18 and defended a hospital, saved nine patients by hacking his way through three walls. He was one of 11 men on that day to win the VC, which in those days could not be awarded posthumously. As well as an old picture, a painting of Fielding was presented recently to club member Mike Morgan.

The club was founded in 1926 and took over an old house in the village. The creation of Cwmbran made big changes to the area, bringing more people into the area though Pontnewydd continued to be known as The Village, and expansion was needed.

In the boom times of the 60s the club acquired the land to build what at the time was a state-of-the art building. Adrian recalls that in those days people used to flood in from Pontnewydd and the next village of Sebastapol - named coincidentally after Sevastapol in the Crimea where two captured Russian cannons were melted down to make the

"I can remember acts like Roy Walker, Eric Delaney and the Dooleys playing at the club. If you weren't here by 5.30 you wouldn't get a seat when the doors opened at 7.0."

These days you don't have to fight quite as hard for a seat but the club and its 780 members are successfully combining the spirit of the old days with a vision of the future.







Former World Darts finalist Phill Nixon, known as the Ferryhill Flyer, has died at the age of 57. Last month we reported how fans had flocked to Ferryhill WMC in Co. Durham after fellow professionals had quickly organised a benefit match on hearing that Phill had been diagnosed with cancer. Even though the games room was full after 10 minutes many happily made a donation and stood outside.

Phill, who was married with eight

children, was the Durham Branch Champion in 2010 and was pairs winner five times. He was also well known for his charity work.

He became famous when he came through three separate qualifying competitions to reach the 2007 World Darts final as a 150-1 outsider. He then came back from 6-0 down in the final against Martin Adams to level the match at 6-6 before eventually losing the deciding leg. Paying tribute, Martin Adams said: "I'd known Phill for a lot of years before he came to prominence at the Lakeside in 2007. He was a great darts player, a great competitor and a very nice man with it. "Sadly we've lost a very good man, who was respected and liked by everybody."
