### WE'VE DONE FOR SMOKERS, NOW FOR THE DRINKERS

MPs' recent decision to attack drinkers is the latest in a long line that has decimated an honourable industry that has served the country and its people for centuries.

For those who support the smoking ban it was a logical step to go on to have a go at alcohol. Since then we have had the huge increase in duty that allowed supermarkets to sell beer much more cheaply than clubs which came on top of changes to gaming and even bingo.

Now we even have Tory MP, Tracey Couch, the Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on alcohol abuse, proposing signs saying "alcohol kills" - ignoring the evidence that drinking moderately and socialising in a club is better for your health than not drinking at all.

Governments of all persuasions have damaged our clubs despite the fact we provide welfare, support the live arts, sports and games and contribute hugely to local, national and international charities. Not all the damage has been caused by the busybody health bigots; most of it has been well meaning but has had an equally disastrous effect.

For instance, in its drive to liberalise gambling the Government allowed betting shops from 2001 to introduce fixed odds betting terminals with higher stakes and higher prizes. Ten years later these machines are regarded as the cause of major gambling problems and the Government is trying to curtail their use. Fruit machines were the lifeblood of our non-profitmaking clubs but members who enjoyed a punt on these machines were enticed into bookmakers as no equivalent increases were given to our clubs – and thousands of pounds were lost in income to our clubs.

### **GRANDPARENTS**

At the same time the Government decided bingo was a priority and under-18s shouldn't be allowed to play. For generations families used to go to clubs together for a game once or twice a week for moderate prizes. With the small stakes it could hardly be called gambling but the Government decided it was so now under-18s can no longer play bingo with their parents and grandparents. The result was the parents just stopped coming to the clubs at all and once more the clubs took a massive hit.

There is no need to repeat the arguments about smoking as even those people who believe "passive smoking" exists and that Roy Castle knew better than his doctors cannot justify stopping adults from using a legal drug on their own in a separate room of a private building. The ban is popular, of course, but the majority who just say "it's got to be a good thing if it means people smoke less" must realise it leads logically to the next step - let's get people drinking less.

### First 11 grand for Sir Bobby

A Northumberland club's members have used their feet to back former England football manager Sir Bobby Robson's goal of defeating cancer.

Ovington Social Club have raised more than £3,000 for the Sir Bobby Robson Foundation with their annual charity walk and have now taken the total they have raised for the charity to £11,500.

"When Sir Bobby set up the charity in 2008 we thought it was a good cause for us to support and we've been backing it ever since," said Committee member Ann Cowperthwaite. "Cancer is something that touches us all - even more so recently as we have lost a couple of members to the disease."

Between 30 and 50 members have taken part each year in the six-mile walk along the River Tyne to the Big Lamp Brewery and back, and this year they were joined by Sir Bobby's oncologist Professor Ruth Plummer, who inspired him to raise £500,000 for a cancer drug trials centre in Newcastle. Sir Bobby raised the £500,000 for the original centre in just seven weeks and went on to spend the last 18 months of his life raising more money to fund cancer projects that directly benefit patients across the North East and Cumbria.

### Club back from the brink - again

A South London club has come back from the brink for the second for all the work to be carried out, which included a new bar, toilets, time by taking the radical step of selling half of its premises.

Southfields Club in Wimbledon was struggling with debts and membership was dwindling because there was no money for the upkeep of the premises. Club Secretary Elaine Reilly came up with the idea of selling half of the club to a nursery, which was already leasing the upstairs half of the club.

"We needed to do something because the club was starting to look very dismal and members were not coming in," said Elaine.

"We have been through some real hard times over the last two years. The building is about 130 years old and it needed a lot of repairs including a new roof."

After receiving more than £300,000 from the sale the club has been able to pay off its debts and re-invest the money on making the club more attractive. The building had to be closed for three weeks

carpets and windows.

Since then membership has increased and after a very successful opening night the club has installed Sky and BT Sport and gone on from strength to strength.

Elaine has been Club Secretary since 2000 when the club made national news as it had an all-woman Committee, made up of members of a darts team who stood for election together and successfully stepped in and turned the club round when it was on the brink of going out of business.

Among the initiatives that brought in new business was a banner outside the club encouraging new members, an introductory £1-a-pint offer for pensioners and a daily happy hour. Elaine also offered complimentary food on lunchtimes with the free Sunday lunch snacks helping to more than double bar takings.

The club still has a strong female influence with five women and four men on its nine-strong Committee, and plans to make the most of

### Mediation can save a fortune



I often receive calls from clubs who have long-term unresolved staff issues.

In the majority of cases the use of workplace mediation would have dealt with these issues more quickly and effectively, saving the club a large amount of money. By Andrew Dane The Business Medic

Instead the problems are allowed to fester leading sometimes to costly consequences when they have to be heard through the formal employment tribunal system.

Workplace Mediation is a confidential and informal way to resolve disagreements or disputes between people who work together. The action is assisted by a trained mediator who acts as a facilitator. The system works by encouraging the club management and staff to speak to each other and reach a mutually agreeable accord that will sort out their problems.

### Music banned at club

A North East club has been hit with a music ban after being caught playing copyrighted tracks without a licence.

The County Durham club, which is not in the Union, had a ban imposed at the High Court In London after an inspector from PPL (Phonographic Performance Ltd) found music playing on the premises when it did not have a PPL licence.

As well as the ban the club's two proprietors have been left with a legal costs bill of £1,833. They were also ordered not to play any more music at any other premises they run until they bring their music licence up to date.

The ban applies to all forms of mechanically recorded music such as records, tapes and CDs in PPL's repertoire.

Music licences can cost hundreds or even thousands of pounds, depending on the size of the venue and the audiences involved.

A spokesman for PPL said: "PPL is the music licensing company which, on behalf of thousands of record company and performer members, licenses recorded music for broadcast, online and public performance use.

"Our 90,000 members include major record labels and independents as well as globally successful performers and session musicians, ranging from orchestral players to percussionists and singers.

"The majority are small businesses, all of whom are legally entitled to be fairly paid for the use of their recordings and performances."

be much more than that.

**Voluntary:** Mediation will not function unless all parties agree to it. It is therefore crucial that the parties are not put under pressure to attend mediation or feel that it will have an adverse effect on them if they decide not to agree to mediation.

The friction could be between two or more people. It gives them or the club management and staff a chance to talk about the situation,

express their concerns to each other and come up with some practical ideas about how things could change for the better. It can cost around £500 but the saving in terms of management time can

A means for reaching agreement: The parties will be asked to identify their issues and concerns. As a consequence, an agenda will be made to help all concerned jointly work towards an acceptable agreement. The mediator will encourage open communication and will assist the parties to come up with ideas that will improve the situation. The aim of mediation is to achieve a win/win conclusion, with the parties being accountable for making changes and agreeing a more positive way of working in the future.

Confidential: Mediation is operated on the basis of all parties acceding to confidentiality between the parties and the mediator. One of the exceptions to this would be if a party raised issues of serious misconduct. The content of mediation is not fed back to club management, staff or members, nor is it recorded in the employee's personal file.

**Quick:** The objective of mediation is to conclude matters at the earliest possible opportunity. Mediation can be arranged in a few days and can usually be completed in one or two days. Three quarters of cases are settled on the day, or shortly thereafter.

Mediation can be a very effective method of resolving all types of disputes in your club such as:

- · Communication issues
- · Personality clashes
- Unresolved or ongoing grievance/disciplinary issues
- Perceived discrimination, harassment or bullying
- Differences of working style
- Inappropriate use of power, status or position
- III health and long-term sick staff
- Problems with drugs or alcohol
- · Capability issues

Henry Shanahan has taken over as our new South Wales Branch Secretary following the retirement of Ken Roberts after 15 years in the job.

Henry was Secretary of Mountain Ash Hibernian Band & Musical Institute from 1980 to 1990 following a spell as a Committee member and as Assistant Secretary. During the 80s he passed the CMD examination and was Secretary of Cardiff General & Municipal Workers Club, running both clubs simultaneously for a while.



The Union's former Convalescent Home at Saltburn has a new 21st century look as the leading club in this gem on the north Yorkshire coast.

Hayes WMC in West London, probably the CIU's most successful club, bought the building earlier this year and, freed from some of the restrictions that applied when it belonged to the Union, have set about making it both busy and profitable.

The building is now officially part of Hayes Club and the new look starts with a reception desk in the new entrance way, which now resembles a club entrance. The main sitting room, which had a small bar off it, has been transformed into a spacious bar/lounge and a French door leads to an outdoor sitting area, which proved amazingly popular during the warm days of July.

"The seats were permanently occupied and as soon as someone stood up to go somebody else was in their seat," said Hayes Club Secretary Bob Daybell. "We've had tremendous support from the

local people. I don't think we could have done what we have done without them."

As we reported at the time the club has offered membership to club members in the town, where the last Union club, Lune Street, closed last year. The bar has operated as a busy club bar, with a regular guest ale on hand pull alongside regular Heineken UK keg beers and lagers, and has proved popular with both guests and locals. Maxine Howes has

returned as Manager as has award-winning gardener lan Harrison and the staffing for high season is up to 19 including six bar staff and four chefs.

While Saltburn's three wings are sapphire, ruby and emerald its high vaulted dining room is the real gem here. The club has been running a very successful carvery with Sunday lunches and children's menus particularly popular. It's now working at creating more of a restaurant atmosphere with tables for two rather than the previous refectory style. Bar meals are also offered next door in the bar.

The three wings are named after jewels because when Darlington industrialist and Quaker Henry Pease founded this delightful clifftop town in 1860, he had a vision that he could recreate Jerusalem. As its 12 foundation stones were named after each of the 12 apostles and were adorned with a jewel so the main streets in Saltburn are named after jewels.

In 1872 Saltburn House was constructed as a convalescent home for workers in his ironstone mines by Joseph Pease with white bricks from his own brickworks and in 1909 it was sold to the Union, which the Peases regarded as a similarly philanthropic organisation with its roots in the temperance movement. It wasn't until the mid-90s that even a small bar was constructed in the building.

The Union upgraded the building's 24 bedrooms at the turn of this century to make them all en suite and Hayes have embarked on a programme of modernisation and redecoration, starting with the emerald wing.

Saltburn regularly hosted the Union's education schools and our Club Law Weekend returns from

October 17-19. What was the snooker room at the end of the building has now been turned into a conference room that can seat 80, creating another opportunity for the club.

"Last month it hosted a school for the Durham miners," said Bob. "We also think it would be good for children's parties or as a function room.

"The only drawback, of course, is that the sea views could prove a distraction to the students."

The schools have always had a reputation of mixing work with pleasure and when those first students return Saltburn House will be ready for them.

A Northamptonshire village club has held a fundraising beer festival to honour the memory of their Stewardess, who has died at the age of 54.

Bev Peacock (pictured) had been Stewardess at Woodford WMC near Kettering for 16 years and had been a strong advocate of the club hosting a beer festival. After she died the Committee decided to ensure she got her wish and held the festival to raise money for the Finedon Ward and Kidney Centre at Northampton General Hospital. Club Secretary Wayne Judkins, who organised the festival, said: "Bev had been

here pretty much since the club started. She was our stewardess for 16 years – this was like her second home.

"Before she passed away we were talking about doing a beer festival, so we decided to carry it on and put her name on it. It's going to be our little tribute."

Almost 200 people attended the two-day event in late July and raised £230. Live music entertained the crowds on the Friday and there was also a range of outdoor fun and games on the following night. Next year the club hope to raise money for the local Air Ambulance and they plan each year to choose a different charity in honour of Bev.

### Now for the drinkers

We have had various initiatives designed to counter problem drinkers and the loud minority of mindless criminals intent on trouble. The beer duty escalator meant our clubs had to put up prices while supermarkets absorbed the costs and drastically widened the differential between on and off-trade prices causing people to drink at home in unsocial and uncontrolled surroundings.

And now we have Tracey Crouch, having the temerity to say that Britons have low understanding of the health problems alcohol contributes to such as cancer, heart disease, strokes and liver disease. The media is awash with dire warnings of the effect of overindulgence and doctors' surgeries have posters plastered all over their walls and warnings on their in-house TVs.

There are dozens of things that can and do maim and kill and, as long as the risks are clearly understood by those who participate, and do not impinge on others' health or safety, it is not any Government's place to interfere. The Government would not dream of stopping rugby, football, driving cars or even sitting outside breathing in diesel fumes.

The continued demonisation of alcohol is going to close many more clubs and pubs than even the smoking ban. To try to reverse the damage already done Government needs to:

- discriminate positively in favour of on-trade businesses so that drinking out for the whole evening in a comfortable, controlled and safe environment becomes the norm. The Union is seeking a reduction to 5% on VAT charged for product sold and consumed on the premises. This would significantly reduce the cost of a pint which, when matched with all the facilities a social club offers, makes going out for the whole evening a lot more attractive.
- allow separate smoking rooms in clubs. Many clubs cannot afford the cost but perhaps the Government could give grants as they caused the problem in the first place?
- and, simplest of all, allow those under 18 to play bingo with a responsible adult.

There is a very serious problem of members of the older generation home alone and drinking themselves into a stupor. Research has shown that going out with like-minded people at least once a month is as good for your health as giving up smoking. We don't know how much the NHS spends on its mostly-futile programmes to try to stop people smoking. It would surely be better if a fraction of that money was spent helping charities like Age UK organise regular trips to our clubs.

This could be to play bingo, enjoy live entertainment, play cards, snooker or darts or any other games or simply meet others and have a chat and a drop of pop. In other words, treat us like adults and give thousands of people their lives back.
