ENGLAND EXPECTS A PACKED CLUB



The World Cup kicks off in Brazil next week - and all clubs now have the opportunity to enjoy extra hours of trade after the Government extended opening hours for England's first two matches.

With England's opening game against Italy at Manaus on the Amazon starting at 11pm clubs faced the prospect of either having to obtain Temporary Event Notices (TENs) or closing after the start of the match. The Union was among the organisations to respond to FIFA WORLD CUP a consultation ordered by the Prime Minister after The Home Office initially came out against a general extension.

The Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank all members and hope they continue to support the Club's Charity.

Following the consultation a Government spokesman said: "The Government believes that England playing in the World Cup is an occasion of exceptional national significance. Clubs are responsibly managed environments and many people will wish to enjoy experiencing the atmosphere of the occasion with fellow football fans, as demonstrated by the enthusiasm of the majority of those who responded to the consultation."

Clubs can open till 1am on Saturday, June 14 when England play Italy and till midnight on Thursday, June 19 when they kick off against Uruguay at 8pm. The extension does not apply on June 24 when their match against Costa Rica kicks off at 5pm. If England progress then where matches kick off at 8pm or later clubs can open till four hours after kick-off or at the latest 1pm.

Head Office Manager Stephen Goulding said: "The Union is pleased to have played its part in changing the Home Office's original decision. This is a great opportunity for clubs to provide a great atmosphere for fans."

This was the second piece of good news for fans: at one point because of the heat in the Amazon jungle the match was scheduled to kick off at 11pm local time - 2am over here.

Union presses HMRC

The Union is continuing to press the tax authorities about repayment of VAT on gaming machines following the Government's Court of Appeal victory in the Linneweber case.

As well as writing to the Treasury Union President George Dawson has written to Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRC) urging them to delay demands of repayment until after the case has been finally decided by the Supreme Court. Some clubs have been told to take out a bank loan to repay the money they were given after an initial victory in the case.

A little beer does you a lot of good

People think wine is healthier to drink than beer. Yet research shows drinking beer is equally healthy and both are far healthier than not drinking at all.

"This dates back many years to when research was carried out in France – a wineproducing country." said Professor Charles Bamforth of the University of California.

"When similar studies were carried out in the Czech Republic, they showed the lowest risk of heart attacks in men who drank 'almost daily or daily' consuming between seven and 16 pints of beer a week. The research showed strong evidence that moderate consumption of any alcoholic drink is linked with a lower risk of heart disease."

Professor Bamforth has previously spoken out against the absurd new trend of having a "Dry January" — though unfortunately his remarks weren't reported in the British press until February this year after a month in which many people had made themselves miserable, hurt their clubs and actually harmed their health.

E-Smoking needs a policy

Sales of e-cigarettes grew by 340 per cent in 2013 and in the UK around 1.3 million people are now "vaping."

The demand for e-cigarettes appears to be insatiable, although there is some doubt about their long-term health benefits.

As e-smokers are categorised by law as non-smokers, this leaves clubs in a dilemma about how to handle e-smokers at work and in the club.

- Should e-smokers be allowed to smoke at their place of work?
- Should e-smokers be required to share the same, usually outdoor, smoking areas as regular smokers or
- Should members and staff be allowed to e-smoke wherever they like?

In specific circumstances it may be reasonable to allow e-smokers to smoke at their place of work. However, depending on the club culture and other factors, this may not be appropriate. Mixing e-smokers with regular smokers could also violate their right to a smoke-free environment. Potentially this could give rise to grievances or at worst, claims for constructive dismissal.

The most important thing is for the club to incorporate an e-smoking policy into an existing smoking policy. And, if there's an existing smoking area for regular smokers, set aside a separate facility for e-smokers. The National Executive looked at this some time ago and recommended that because it can cause confusion and confrontation e-smokers should be treated the same as smokers.

By making these simple but effective changes, the potential for problems with e-smoking will successfully be avoided.

You must submit returns to FCA

Clubs must register annual returns each year to the FCA (Financial Conduct Authority). It is a legal requirement for clubs to submit annual returns; the FCA are not able to waive it.

The FCA informed Head Office that some clubs are under the impression that

provided a club's accounts are submitted to the CIU, this also covers the FCA.

The FCA require all relevant information at the appropriate time otherwise the club could become de-registered.

The FCA make a request by letter to clubs each September for the annual returns to be submitted and the fees to be paid. The FCA issue two reminder letters if the debt remains unpaid.

If a club fails to submit its returns it lays itself open to prosecution. This can result in a fine and/or cancellation of its registration. If no returns are submitted enforcement officers may prosecute in court if returns are still not forthcoming and a club's registration could be cancelled.

If a club becomes de-registered it will no longer have the same protection as a registered club. Officers and members of the club will be exposed to personal financial risk and legal action against the club could be made against a named officer.

Heath Robinson club loses alcohol licence

Clubs have been warned to keep on top of their maintenance after a proprietary club in Blackpool lost its licence for adopting what was described as a "Heath Robinson" approach.

The Council's licensing panel revoked the club's alcohol licence after hearing infringements of fire safety requirements were among the worst to be seen in the town.

Enforcement officer Mark Marshall told the Committee the fire escape was about to break down because of rust and rot and it looked like it had not been maintained for a number of years.

He added that there were various Heath Robinson-type repairs that had been done to the drainage, there was a tinder box of combustible materials being stored in the cellar while the fire alarm was inoperable and sewage had overflowed into the rear yard of the premises. "I have not seen a list so comprehensive about what's wrong in terms of fire safety for many years, if at all."

The club's owner said he had leased the premises but had now taken back control and was in the process of carrying out the necessary work to regain his licence.

National Minimum Wage

The National Minimum Wage will increase on October 1 from £6.31 to £6.50.

The development rate - which covers workers aged 18-20 years - is up 2% from £5.03 to £5.13

The rate for 16 and 17-year-olds rises by 2% from £3.72 to £3.79

The apprentice minimum wage rate will go up by 5p from £2.68 to £2.73 per hour. It applies to all apprentices under the age of 19 and those aged 19 and over in the first 12 months of their apprenticeship.

The December 31 deadline for replacing R22 refrigerant gas is approaching fast and will affect clubs whose cellar cooler or air conditioning systems are more than eight years old.

Club Secretary Lee Whitton at Lee Mount Club in Halifax gave National Account supplier Smart Energy a call after he read in Club Journal about the work National President George Dawson, the Secretary of the nearby Arden Road Club, had had done at the club. THE SIGNS ARE

Pull up outside Broomhill Albion Club and it's soon clear that this is an enterprising go-ahead club. Two cabins in the car park accommodate a clothes bank and a bookmaker's — now no longer going — and signboards outside the front door advertise the club's prize bingo evenings and its weekly grand auction.

"We had a bit of an argument with the council because they claimed they would distract drivers," said Club Secretary John Harley. "But they accepted them in the end." That's typical of this club and of John, a retired gas engineer, who has enterprise



in the blood and has even been nicknamed Del Boy. As well as being the club's Secretary and odd job man – he was repairing the club's toilets when *Club Journal* called and conducted the interview in his overalls – he runs a screen printing business and turns out flyers and posters to promote club events and has printed up polo shirts for the Committee.

One of the club's most recent ventures was to buy a pool table for the refurbished games room. This has paid off spectacularly with the club now hosting three pool teams including a team from the Midlands Superleague, who regularly bring 30 to 40 spectators, as well as regular dominoes, and men's and women's darts teams. Posters of Muhammad Ali adorn the new look games room and the club has also knocked through into a little used lounge to create a room that can be used for functions; the club is particularly popular for funerals and wakes as for more than 60 years it has been situated at a crossroads opposite the cemetery in Cannock, where it began in a small house.

One man who can remember those days is Arthur Wood, now 78, who has been a member since he was 17 and still has a bowl he won in a raffle at the club 60 years ago. "In those days we were all in one room, with a fire in the middle of the room and the stage at one end." These days that room is the concert room which is packed at weekends for live entertainment and for the club's popular weekly auction which is run by auctioneer Andy Carlos. "I've bought everything there from a packet of sweets to a set of car parts," said John. "It's amazingly popular."

The room is also used for bingo three nights a week. It has a small kitchen off it making it ideal for meetings of the club's weekly over-55 section –still called the over-60s club – and by the club's pigeon section.

The club also stage charity evenings with the help of their main suppliers Coors, who have sponsored the Whizz-kidz disabled children's charity for three years. Committee members Sarah Johnston and Anne Holland, the wife of President Joe Holland, raised £300 with a coffee morning for Macmillan Cancer Support

UNION KEEPS UP PRESSURE

Union President George Dawson has written to the tax authorities asking them to help clubs facing the prospect of paying back thousands of pounds in VAT following the Linneweber case.

Hundreds of clubs received repayments of VAT along with the lead appellant the Rank Organisation – though they were always told there was a possibility of this having to be repaid. In a surprise twist in October the Court of Appeal reversed its decision and HMRC started asking for repayments – even though the case is now expected to go to an appeal at the Supreme Court.

HMRC say they recognise that paying the money back in one lump sum will be difficult for some clubs and advise Committees to discuss arrangements. Some offices, however, have been less helpful and have suggested to clubs that they take out a bank loan to pay the money. Rates of interest charged are also way above what clubs could have obtained had they invested the money.

The full text of the President's letter to Mr P Sears of the Indirect Tax Directorate is below.

Dear Mr Sears

The Club and Institute Union (CIU) aims to support and promote the interests of non-profit making private members clubs, principally the wide range of social and recreation clubs affiliated to club governing bodies comprising the Committee of Registered Club Associations (CORCA).

In total CORCA organisations have some 4000 member clubs across the UK whose aggregate individual membership is around three million. The vast majority of parliamentary constituencies will include one or more CORCA member clubs e.g.CIU.

Revenue and Customs Brief O1/14 notifies operators of gaming machines of official action following the decision of the Court of Appeal in the case of HMRC v The Rank Group plc. Along with the lead appellant (Rank Group plc) many other gaming machine operators, including a substantial number of CIU clubs received repayments of VAT during 2010/11 following earlier litigation. They were also issued with protective assessments to allow HMRC to recover these repayments if, in ongoing litigation, HMRC was ultimately successful. As the Court of Appeal has found that there was no breach of fiscal neutrality, as contended by claimant operators, HMRC has now decided to pursue recovery of the repaid VAT from all the operators concerned. Claimant CIU clubs have now started to receive repayment demands for the sums previously received.

The requirement to repay the money involved will cause hardship to many clubs, although we note that HMRC indicates a willingness to consider individual circumstances where full repayment cannot be made by the due date.

I attach a copy of a letter from the Minister which reinforces this message.

However, in reality, our clubs are receiving mixed messages from HMRC, with some being offered a structured reasonable repayment where others have not.

The CIU National Executive is also concerned at what we consider to be punitive levels of interest being added to the amount to be repaid by each club. This is set at a level considerably higher than the original monies received by clubs would ever accrue, if invested upon receipt.

We would emphasise that CIU clubs, as private members' clubs, are family and community oriented and provide much needed employment in their localities; many of them are just getting by financially and it would benefit neither the clubs, their members, or the Exchequer to rigorously hasten the repayment process and add higher levels of interest, thereby putting clubs' future viability at risk.

I would be happy to meet with you to discuss any concerns HMRC may have.







Oldies honour 'dodgy' Nee

A North East club has now raised more than £10,000 in memory of a footballer who died from leukaemia nine years ago.

Simonside Social Club in South Shields has been staging an annual football match in honour of father-of-two Terry Nee known as "Dodgy", who both played for and managed the club's football team before he died at the age of 41.

Now in its eighth year, the game between football veterans and younger players raised £1,026 for Leukaemia Research, which was handed over to Terry's widow, Angela, at the club. The old boys – some in their fifties – ended up beating their younger rivals 5-2, at Harton and Westoe Welfare Ground.

About 200 players and onlookers helped raise £1,026, and a cheque was accepted on behalf of the charity by Club Chairman Bob Gray, who said: "The oldest player was Terry Wilson, who is 57, and on the other side was his 17-year-old son James.

"Most of the golden oldies, as we like to call them, played the whole game despite some being in their fifties. The game always draws a big crowd as Terry was such a likeable lad. "After his funeral I suggested staging a match in his honour, and it has just snowballed over the years. We must have raised about £10,000 for Leukaemia Research in the last nine years."

Quantity and quality from club players

A father and son have raised money for cancer research at a Kent club by beating the world record for playing table tennis.

Peter Ives and his son Daniel played non-stop for eight hours, 40 minutes and 10 seconds at Plumstead Radical Club, beating the previous record by 10 minutes. The pair estimate that they each hit the ball 16,000 times.

Daniel (24), runs the Tabletennisdaily website, which broadcast the game live to 7,000 viewers. He aimed to raised £800 for Prostate Cancer UK but has so far received £1,716.21.

Kevin Plowman, who plays table tennis for Scissett WMC in the Huddersfield League, has become Britain's national disabled tennis champion.

The national championship in Grantham was organised by the British Table Tennis Association for People with Disabilities and attracted the best wheelchair players in the country. Kevin, who had previously played most of his table tennis in able bodied leagues, won both his class singles and the open events as an unranked player.

Kevin (53) was a talented badminton player before he was paralysed from the chest down in a mountaineering accident on the Isle of Skye when he was 28. In 2001 he was one of four people who were the first to demonstrate wheelchair lawn tennis at Wimbledon and in 2004 he represented Britain in the sport at the Paralympics in Athens.
