George Smith wins a second term as President of the Union

George Smith of the Durham Branch has been elected to serve his second term as President of the CIU following the election held in December.

Mr Smith, who has been Union President since 2020, is the current Branch Secretary for Durham and took 74 per cent of the vote to win the election against his rival for the position, George Dawson CMD.

In total, two of the 11 NEC districts were contested in the election – District 4 and District 5.

The election for District 4 (York City/Leeds/Wakefield and Doncaster) saw incumbent NEC Member and Doncaster Branch Secretary Dave Gravel CMD beat the challenge of Leeds Branch Secretary Glenn Doyle to retain his seat.

In District 5 (West Yorkshire/Heavy Woollen and South Yorkshire), Mark Fergusson of Brinsworth Social Club polled ahead of the incumbent, Heavy Woollen Branch Secretary Les Hepworth CMD, and takes his seat on the NEC.

With the incumbent NEC representative for South East Midlands and Warwickshire, Carol Goddard,



stepping down (see page 15 for an interview with her), the position on the NEC has been filled by Geoff Fisher of the Warwickshire Branch.

Ken Roberts CMD ACM, President of South Wales Branch, was returned unopposed in the position of Union Vice-President, while the incumbent NEC Members in the other eight districts will continue in their roles for the period of 2022-2023.

Live TV fixtures for early rounds of 2022 Super League announced

The live televised fixtures for the first few rounds of the 2022 Super League regular season were released in December and sees the season getting underway with a rematch of the 2021 Grand Final between St Helens and Catalans Dragons.

Reigning champions Saints take on Catalans on Thursday, February 10 in the competition which runs for 27 rounds, including Magic Weekend in Newcastle on July 9 and 10.

The play-offs for the top six finishers commence in mid-September with the showpiece Grand Final at Old Trafford on Saturday, September 24.

The majority of live televised fixtures will be broadcast on Sky Sports but a further 10 games will be showing on free-to-air television for the first time in the competition's 26-year history, on Channel 4 as part of a new two-year deal.

Channel 4's Super League coverage starts on February 12 when eight-time Champions Leeds Rhinos host Warrington Wolves.

The remaining nine games on Channel 4 will be spread across the season and include two end of season play off fixtures.



Devastating blow for Prudhoe USC as roof is blown off by high winds during Storm Arwen

The United Services Club in Prudhoe, Northumberland suffered a major blow in December after the roof of its Concert Room was blown off by high winds during Storm Arwen.

A large section of the roof came away from the building and crashed to the ground nearby but luckily nobody was hurt by the flying debris.

The club's Steward, Glenn McCann, witnessed the incident and told the *Northern Echo*: "It is going to keep our Concert Room closed for months. Fortunately we can still trade in the Bar.

"That room constitutes the difference between us making a loss or breaking even to making a profit.

"It is where all the live music happens and we had lots of bookings in the room with weddings and such like and we've had to cancel them all.

"We don't know the cost yet, we're in the process of speaking to the insurance. It will be into the tens of thousands.

"The whole Concert Room is under water so we will need new dancefloors, carpets, seating. We're just waiting to hear.

"I've never seen winds like that. I think the northerly wind just came straight at us.

"That roof has only been on for seven years. You would never expect it."

Wadsley Bridge WMC stages 100-Year Anniversary spectacular for its members



The first legs will be spread out across February 15, 16, 22 and 23 with the second legs on March 8, 9, 15 and 16, with live coverage of all the games on BT Sport.

Chelsea are the only English side to play their first leg at home, with the other three all away first after winning their groups.

New Lodge Working Mens Club

Following a £250,000 refurbishment carried out in 2021, New Lodge Working Mens Club in Barnsley has bounced back from the pandemic and is reporting a huge growth in trade

Like many CIU clubs, New Lodge Working Mens Club in Barnsley, South Yorkshire refused to sit idly by during the Government-imposed lockdowns in 2020 and 2021.

Instead, the Committee decided to look for the silver lining within the pandemic cloud and set about ensuring that when they were finally allowed to reopen their doors, the club would be ready to hit the ground running.

"Sadly, the previous Secretary passed away just before the pandemic hit and I was voted in, along with several new Committee members, prior to the first lockdown," says Club Secretary Frank Poulton.

"That new group brought a different perspective to running the

club and set about making it a 21st Century venue.

"As soon as I took over, I did my own in-depth survey of the entire building and made a list of recommendations to present to the Committee.

"The club hadn't had a significant amount of money spent on it for quite a while so there were some outstanding issues which needed addressing.

"For a start, the club was looking a bit outdated as some things hadn't been touched for a couple of decades.

"Likewise, the toilets were in need of an upgrade as several members had noted recently that they were looking a bit run down.

"We felt that lockdown was the best possible time to get major work undertaken as the club was empty so there would be no disruption to members and we had the funds in the bank for a refurbishment as well as for essential maintenance.

"Firstly, we had a new roof put in, all the guttering replaced, repointed some of the brickwork on the outside of the club and installed new fire doors.

"That was followed by a complete rewiring of the entire club to ensure all the electrics were up to date before moving on to refurbishing the bars and the five washrooms.

"Behind the scenes, our Storeroom was upgraded and we also carried out some work on our drains to make sure they are fit for purpose.

"It was a real first-class job all round and cost us around £250,000. When we reopened, the members were delighted with what had been done.

"All the positive feedback from the members has been great and the excitement generated by the refurbishments really helped us to relaunch successfully when we were allowed to reopen in July 2021.

"It's my view that it's crucial to reinvest in the facilities, otherwise you end up with fewer and fewer people coming in, your trade takes a hit and you've subsequently got less money to spend on the club.

"It can become a downward spiral which threatens the future of a club. We've taken that step forward and made the investment and it's really paying off."

But it is not just the fixtures and fittings which have been brought up to date, the club has also taken a leap forward in technological terms.

"We've installed a new EPOS till system which has revolutionised our bar operation," says Frank.

"Before we were using a manual system but the new system is much more efficient.

"At the same time, we've installed Freeflow and brought in Bier Pro, the new line cleaning system, in order to ensure that our beers are of the highest quality. It has also helped us make a massive reduction in beer and water wastage.

"All these systems mean you can log on to the software and instantly see what's selling well, what needs reordering, how much you're taking, etc.

"We've really taken a leap forward in what we have to offer, with a greater range of drinks – including a gin station with several different varieties of gin as well as premium mixers – and a fantastic choice of beers, ciders, wines, shots and spirits.

"There's a brand-new ice machine plus two new glass-washing machines to replace the old ones we had before so everything runs much more smoothly and efficiently now."

"As any club official knows, however much you do, there are always further improvements that can be made and, as a Committee, we're continually looking at how we can make the club better for members.

"You have to change with the times and constantly examine what you're doing, otherwise you can stagnate as a club. We're delighted that the changes we've implemented are paying off with some excellent trading figures since we reopened.

"In particular, we've found that the younger end of the membership are coming into the club more often which is something which bodes well for the future.

"Understandably there are still major worries about COVID on the part of some members – especially with the spread of new variants - but we've tried to put them at ease as best we can with rigorous hygiene measures implemented throughout the club."

Frank believes that communicating with the club's members and giving them a full picture of what the club can offer is vital to foster community spirit.

"We've got a new Committee member who is going to oversee the revamping of the website," he says.

"We see that as something which is a crucial way of communicating with our members and letting them know about all the activities and live entertainment we have coming up.

"We're very community-orientated and in normal times we have various annual trips such as a day out at the races or day trips to the seaside for the kids and their parents, as well as



children's parties and performances throughout the year, including during the festive period.

"Obviously, none of those went ahead in 2020 and 2021 but we're hoping that during 2022 we'll be able to get some trips sorted."

The club's approach certainly seems to be paying off with over 3,000 members on its books and a waiting list of 200 eager to join up.

"There has been massive interest from new people eager to join," says Frank.

"New people come in and look around the club and see how great it

looks and then see our fantastic bar prices and want to sign up immediately.

"When we reopened, we decided that we'd cut the prices at the bar by 20p a pint as a benefit to the members who, after all, have stuck by the club and supported it through the pandemic.

"That is certainly encouraging people to come more often and we're consistently busy throughout the week."

In addition to the very favourable pricing policy at the bar, the wide array of activities taking place at the



 club also encourages people through the doors.

"We have always enjoyed flourishing sports sections – darts, snooker, pool, football, golf and fishing – and getting them back up and running again in 2021 was crucial for us as they all help build trade at the bar and give members a reason to come in on a regular basis," says Frank.

"Our football, darts, snooker and pool teams all play in the local leagues while the golf and fishing sections normally meet up at the club, head off on their trips and then return to the club for a few drinks after the day's activities.

"There are also plans for ballroom dancing classes to start in 2022 at the club.

"That's something which is very popular at the moment and is likely to be well supported by members as well as potentially bringing new people into the club."

Meanwhile, free live entertainment at the weekend continues to be a huge draw for members.

"We've also started putting on live entertainment on a Friday night as well as on Saturdays and Sundays and that has really taken off," says Frank.

"Members couldn't wait to get back to seeing bands, comedians and singers again after lockdown.

"We have a good mix of acts from across the various eras so there's something to interest all tastes.

"Recently we've had Pink and Cher tribute acts and they were both absolutely fantastic.

"We followed those acts up with a bumper roster of acts throughout December.

"One important thing is that we don't believe in charging our members to come into the club.

"That means we don't charge them extra for live entertainment by selling tickets for an event.

"We see it as another benefit of becoming a member of the club and are happy to pay for the acts and then see a boost in trade over the bar."

Another benefit of membership is the chance to enjoy televised live sport.

"We recently installed a large screen in the Tap Room to help create a great atmosphere and we have a further three screens so we can show all the live games on BT Sport and Sky Sports," says Frank.

"Premier League football is very popular, particularly whenever Liverpool or Manchester United are playing so we get a good crowd in.

"We're also planning to get another big screen in the Concert Room ready for the 2022 World Cup which begins in November.

"We were lucky enough to be open for the Euros in 2021 and, even with the restrictions that were in force, it was a fantastic success and bodes well for the World Cup.

"Then, throughout the week, we'll have the horse racing coverage in addition to the major sporting events, like international cricket in the summer."

As for the club's next round of improvements, Frank already has a list of future projects drawn up.

"Replacing all the furniture is a priority in the near future as is upgrading the main entrance to the club," he says.

"We're very pleased with how the club is doing at the moment and the huge support we receive from our members.

"We want to keep repaying our members for their loyalty by increasing the benefits of belonging to New Lodge WMC."

Carol Goddard steps down as NEC member

After a decade representing the clubs of South East Midlands and Warwickshire on the NEC, Carol Goddard, the first-ever female member of the NEC, decided not to seek re-election at the end of 2021



Q: What spurred your decision not to seek re-election at the end of 2021?

Carol Goddard: When I made the decision not to stand for re-election, I hadn't actually realised that I'd served on the NEC for 10 years so my decision wasn't really anything to do with reaching that milestone.

There was no one particular reason which spurred the decision, it just felt like the time to give someone else the opportunity to represent the clubs of South East Midlands and Warwickshire at a national level.

Q: And, of course, your time as an NEC member was just one of many CIU roles you've held over the years?

CG: Absolutely, I've had a number of roles within the CIU and actually started off working for South East Midlands Branch under the then Union President Derek Dormer OBE in 1982.

I was there when the CIU helped to form the All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for Non-Profit Making Members' Clubs at Westminster and was responsible for attending every meeting and producing the Official Minutes.

I subsequently became the Liaison Officer for the Committee of Registered Clubs Associations (CORCA) of which the CIU was a founding member.

Both organisations remain key forums for the CIU to ensure that its clubs' interests are represented in Parliament and the Lords and I hope that the regular APPG meetings, which were put on hold by the Coronavirus pandemic, will resume shortly.

Q: You must have noticed some huge changes since your early days with the CIU?

CG: So much has changed since I first became involved both in clubs and in society in general, not least in terms of how technology and computerisation have changed how clubs are run.

There has also been a significant increase in the regulatory burden placed on our clubs and our officials have to work far harder in the modern era to ensure that they are up to date with all the latest legislation concerning clubs.

The fact that women were given full CIU membership rights in 2007 was a major landmark for the Union and something that has been a real positive for the organisation and its clubs. There are now lots of women in prominent roles at our clubs and hopefully they will be encouraged to come through in greater numbers at branch and national levels.

On a personal level, that significant change to the Constitution allowed me to become Branch Vice-President

and I also stood for the role of Union Vice-President.

That was a great experience and attracted a bit of attention from the national media, with the result that I was interviewed by the BBC's Political Correspondent John Sergeant for the One Show. He came to the club and ended up having such a great time in the bar with the members that he missed his train home!

In 2010, I was elected Branch Secretary and held that role until two or three years ago when I stepped down for personal reasons.

Then, in 2011 I was delighted to become the first woman to join the NEC and I have thoroughly enjoyed the experience over the past decade of working alongside my fellow NEC members.

I also enjoyed visiting clubs and was particularly honoured to take part in many clubs' centenary celebrations over the years.

Of course, everyone has been through an extremely tough time in the past couple of years due to the COVID-19 pandemic but it does seem that the majority of clubs have come through the uncertainty and are now looking forward to the future with a lot of confidence and with their members and local communities as determined as ever to support them.

I will certainly miss the camaraderie of being an NEC member but have no doubt that my successor, Geoff Fisher of the Warwickshire Branch, will do a fantastic job on the NEC.

Q: And no doubt you'll continue to be involved with clubs and the CIU?

CG: I certainly hope to be involved with clubland for many years to come and will hopefully be attending Conference Weekend in Blackpool in April.
