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'Clubs are going above and beyond to keep members safe'

Union General Secretary Kenneth D Green CMD ACM has hailed the huge efforts made by clubs to keep their members safe since they were allowed to reopen.

"It's clear that CIU clubs have worked extremely hard to ensure that they are fully compliant with the COVID-secure guidelines since the reopening of English clubs in July and Welsh clubs in August," he said.

"As our recent survey showed, many clubs turned the negative of the shutdown into a positive, using those months to make major improvements to their facilities and put in place the key measures that would be required post-lockdown.

"That includes creating new furniture layouts and one-way walkways, as well as instituting protocols to capture members' details for the NHS Test & Trace system.

"In many instances, our clubs are going above and beyond the guidelines so they can continue serving their communities more effectively.

"That extremely high level of compliance across CIU clubs, which has seen club officials and staff working



hand-in-hand with local licensing authorities, has helped to give members the confidence to return in significant numbers to their clubs and provide clubland the boost it needs after the shutdown.

"But don't forget that the Union is on hand to support your club during these tough times, so don't hesitate to get in touch with your Branch Secretary for advice if you require it.

"Meanwhile, as a Union, we will continue to lobby the Government for ongoing help for our sector."

Minster Social Club in Sheppey stages popular outdoor live entertainment

Minster Working Men's Club in Sheppey, Kent was one of the first clubs in the country to stage live entertainment having put on outdoor events in mid-July, more than a month ahead of the Government's edict to allow indoor performances.

The club used their outside patio area to put on the event with club favourite Mike Harris performing to a socially distanced audience.

Club steward Ray Seager said: "When I heard the Government was allowing live music outside I checked with PRS (Performing Rights Society) to ensure we were covered.

"The local council also said we could do this with our existing entertainment licence.

"We normally have entertainers every Sunday afternoon and often on Saturday nights. They must have suffered terribly during the lockdown so we wanted to make it as easy as possible for them to perform.

"Mike is one of our regulars so we asked if he'd be prepared to come along. We can seat six people safely at each of our tables on the verandah."



England to play Australia in ODI and Twenty20 series in September on Sky

England's limited-overs series at home to Australia will go ahead as planned in September.

The series, which ensures England are able to fulfil all 18 international fixtures which were scheduled ahead of the Coronavirus pandemic, will consist of three Twenty20s at the Ageas Bowl followed by three ODIs at Emirates Old Trafford.

The Twenty20 series is played across September 4, 6 and 8, while the ODIs will be played on September 11, 13 and the final match of the tour on September 16.

The ODIs will form part of the International Cricket Council's new ODI Super League, which England kicked off with their recent 2-1 series victory against Ireland.

All the tour matches will be shown live on Sky Sports.

Union clubs hail return of live entertainment as a boost for trade

The news that clubs are now permitted to stage indoor performances with socially distanced audiences will be greeted with delight by the majority of CIU members. *Club Journal* talks to several clubs about how the lack of live entertainment has affected them and how they have managed to the hit the ground running after reopening



Many clubs will have heaved a huge sigh of relief when the Government announced that live indoor performances would be permitted from Saturday, August 15.

The announcement ended a period of uncertainty for the huge number of clubs which rely on live entertainment to get people through their doors, something which is absolutely crucial as they try and build up trade from a standing start following that painful and frustrating three-month lockdown.

So, what will the return of live entertainment mean for our clubs?

"We have been doing alright since reopening on July 4," says John Musgrave, President of **Ossett Central WMC** in Yorkshire.

"Our takings are down on what they would normally be at this time of year but at the same time our outgoings were reduced in some areas, such as paying for entertainment acts.

"The overall numbers of people coming in was down because we didn't have live entertainment and that tends to be the biggest draw for our members.

"But numbers were still encouraging in the first month or so, particularly at weekends and it was clear that people wanted to come to the club having missed the experience during the shutdown.

"Getting the live entertainment back on is going to make a massive difference to us. Having live acts on a Saturday and Sunday, plus a top tribute act once a month on a Friday night are very, very popular with our members.

"Our Concert Secretary actually emailed the Culture Secretary Oliver Dowden direct to try and get some clarification on the issue so we were delighted when they made the announcement that live indoor entertainment was allowed again from August 15.

"I do feel that there has been a general lack of clarity and detail from the Government when it comes to what we need to do as a club.

"We want to get it right and not have a situation where we think we're following the guidelines and then the local licensing authority comes in and tell us we're doing something wrong."

The inevitable dip in trade experienced by the club has also caused some friction with certain suppliers.

"Our normal beer supplier told us that they wouldn't take an order for less than £400 but if we stuck to that we might find that beer was going out of date before we could sell it due to the lower numbers of people coming in," explains John.

"So, we switched to another supplier who didn't insist on a minimum

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order. We're also due compensation for the beer which we had to pour away during the closure which will really help us when it is paid.

"We've worked hard as a club to follow the guidelines to the letter and ensure that our members and staff feel safe and we've had nothing but positive feedback from our members.

"It's all very encouraging so far and we're hoping that trade returns to normal levels over the coming months and getting the live entertainment to the fore will be the key to that."

The return of live entertainment to clubs is also a cause of celebration for the **Remembrance Club** in Castle Bromwich, Birmingham.

"The club has been much quieter than usual since we reopened," says Secretary Val McConnell.

"Pre-lockdown we were turning over about £16,000 a week and currently (mid-August) we're at about £5,000 a week.

"We just weren't seeing the usual numbers coming through our doors and it was mainly down to the lack of live entertainment during that first month.

"We normally have a 'Free & Easy' on a Thursday and a live band on a Saturday which really pack the place out so having our live regular entertainment schedule back up and running is so important to the club.

"We had a singer booked and ready to go on Saturday, August 1 when live entertainment was meant to be coming back but had to cancel it the day before when the Government made their announcement that it was being put on hold.

"We're very happy that indoor performances are now permitted and it will make a big difference to trade."

She adds: "I think many of our older members are a bit wary of coming out even though we have put in place all the safety measures required and even take people's temperatures on entering the club.

"It's a word of mouth thing really and we find that once they come in and they see all the extra safeguards which have been put in place to keep people safe, they can relax and enjoy themselves and will feel more confident about returning on a regular basis.

"We have restarted bingo sessions and that is proving popular so we're very hopeful that things will continue to go in the right direction, especially with live acts giving people another reason to come in."

Entertainment has been the key to enticing members back into

Rossington Labour Club in

Doncaster but rather than sit back and play the waiting game with the Government, the club wasted no time in turning its spacious car park into an open-air Concert Room.

"After we reopened we sat down as a Committee with the Steward and had a discussion about how best to entice members back and decided that outdoor live entertainment would be a good option for us," explains Club President Andy Lee.

"We have a large car park at the club so we booked singers for a number of weekend since reopening and it

has been amazing for us, particularly with the good weather we had – we've had a really good party atmosphere on every occasion we've done it so far.

"Obviously, we're still enforcing the social distancing measures outside and also have our staff offering table service and it's really given members a reason to come and visit the club.

"And once they came through the doors they can see what has been done to conform to the COVID-19 measures – including one-way systems, sanitiser stations, temperature checks and Committee members on the door to greet and guide members to tables – they realise they're in a safe environment and will keep coming back.

"So, we've ensured that the club has hit the ground running following the reopening and want to continue to build on that momentum going forward."

Pittshill Victory WMC in Stokeon-Trent reopened its doors on Wednesday, July 8 and experienced sluggish trade in the early weeks following the end of the shutdown.

"Having completely reorganised the club to fit in with the social distancing measures and all the other Government guidelines, we were very concerned on the first night of reopening that we would not be able to accommodate everyone if too many members turned up," says Secretary and Treasurer Dan Capewell.

"We had space for 140 but on the first night of opening, around 60 members turned up. It hovered around that level for a while but has thankfully increased with around 100 people coming in on the busiest days. At the moment, we're open on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

"Of course, it was a very expensive process to get geared up for the reopening in the first place with all the measures needing to be sorted out.

"We initially intended to install perspex screens across the bar but just couldn't source a company which Could supply them, such was the demand at the time.

"Instead we purchased a number of free-standing sneeze guards to install at various places across the club.

"We also put up 'We Are Open' banners outside the club to get the word out to the local community but it takes time for people to be comfortable getting out and about when the Government has been telling them to stay home for a long period of time.

"The uncertainty over live entertainment has not been very helpful either as we had acts booked for August 1 and August 8 and had to cancel them when the Government made its late announcement on July 31 that the introduction of indoor performances was going to be delayed.

"That uncertainty made it extremely difficult to plan ahead so it was very welcome when they allowed live indoor performances from August 15 and gave that certainty which allows you to go out and publicise the events.

"As a club, we've been very prudent over the years and built up a decent reserve so we're in a good position even though we have been hit in the last few weeks with a £50,000 roof repair which had to be carried out.

"Hopefully we can get through this initial slowish period and then get back to a level commensurate with where we were before."

At **Old Bank WMC** in Mirfield, West Yorkshire, the club is pulling out all the stops to encourage members back into the club.

"We've worked really hard to ensure the club is fully compliant with the Government guidelines but it does mean that we have a reduced capacity at the moment," says Club Treasurer Christine Green.

"That means it's not really viable to get live entertainment back on at the moment until we have the capacity to make it worthwhile and can make the money back that we would be paying an act.

"But we have held regular bingo sessions and we've also held a music quiz night, hosted for free by one of our members, which went down really well and gave people a big incentive to come and visit the club.

"Bowling is a big part of the club and we've organised an all-club handicap tournament where bowlers and non-bowlers can take part under social distancing guidelines.

"We're also laying on hot food and sandwiches so it will be a great occasion for members to get together and enjoy themselves.

"So, we're trying everything we can to entice people back into the club during the early months since reopening and will be looking forward to getting back up to full capacity throughout the club and putting on the full range of entertainment which has made the club so successful."

Government issues guidance on staging live indoor entertainment in clubs

Culture Secretary Oliver Dowden gave the go-ahead to clubs in England to resume socially-distanced indoor performances from August 15 after a two-week delay following a rise in Coronavirus cases

The Government has produced guidance on how clubs can reduce the risk of Coronavirus infection when staging indoor performances on its website.

The measures include reduced venue capacity and limited ticket sales to aid social distancing while venues are also being asked to "consider" the ventilation rates that can be applied to the premises and whether this can be adjusted sufficiently to deliver a safe environment for all those due to attend."

Key measures

- Social distancing between all the different households involved should be adhered to, with clear markings in place and a limited entry approach
- Avoidance of heavy queuing when entering or exiting a venue
- Increased deep cleaning of performance spaces
- Performers should social distance and use back-to-back or side-to-side positioning (rather than face-to-face)

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Clubs get set for new football season

The new Premier League season gets underway this month as Liverpool attempt to defend the title they won in style last season. There will also be a return to the top flight for Fulham, West Bromwich Albion and, following a 16-year wait, Leeds United, who open their account with an away trip to face the champions at Anfield



Last season's football season may have been disrupted by the Coronvirus pandemic but let's hope that during the 2020/21 season, there won't be any interruptions to what promises to be another fascinating battle for the Premier League title.

There are three new teams involved in the top flight this season – Fulham, West Bromwich Albion and Leeds United.

Leeds have not competed at this level since the 2003/04 season and their army of fans will be willing them to be a competitive force in this season's Premier League after finishing head and shoulders above their closest rivals to win the Championship title outright.

The Whites will certainly get an early indicator of their relative standing in the Premier League, having been handed an away trip to Anfield to face Liverpool in the opening round of the competition on the weekend of September 12.

Leeds United's return to the topflight football has certainly brought some cheer to Swarcliffe Working Men's Club in Leeds, a club which is renowned for showing live sport.

"It's massive for the city as a whole and for us as a club to have Leeds United back in the Premier League after such a long time away," says Glenn Doyle, Club Secretary of Swarcliffe WMC, Branch Secretary of Leeds and himself a diehard Leeds United fan.

"When Huddersfield beat West Brom 2-1 in that Friday night Championship game in July, effectively promoting us to the Premier League, it was a massive night of celebration in our club and a huge night across the city with thousands of fans assembling in the Millennium Square to mark the occasion. "We have both BT Sport and Sky Sports in the club so we'll be hoping to enjoy a real boost in trade on the back of the televised Leeds games throughout the season.

"Obviously we used to show all the Championship games that were shown on Sky Sports last season featuring United but having them in the Premier League should draw even more people into the club.

"Even though the COVID-19 guidelines are in force when it comes to showing live sport, including keeping the volume down during matches, members still want to come down to the club to enjoy the big matches.

"We did some great trade in July when we had the postponed games from the end of last season showing in the club.

"There was also a lot of interest in the delayed UEFA Champions League and Europa League fixtures

 in August – at least there was until all the English sides were knocked out.

"The new season gets off to a great start with us taking on Liverpool at Anfield.

"You couldn't really ask for more for the first fixture – Champion v Champion – and it'll give us a real idea of where we are as a team and see how we play against the very best.

"It should be a good match with Leeds playing a high-pressure style of football and Liverpool being a great counter-attacking side.

"We traditionally get good crowds in for football right across the weekend and the double headers on a Sunday are particularly beneficial to trade and everyone here is really looking forward to seeing how United do this season.

"Then, when the Premier League campaign is all done and dusted, we have the delayed European Championship to enjoy next summer."

Leeds' fellow Premier League new boys Fulham host Arsenal in an opening weekend London derby, while West Bromwich take on Leicester City at The Hawthorns.

Manchester City v Aston Villa and Burnley v Manchester United have been postponed to allow City and United extra time to recover from their recent European campaigns, which finished in mid-August, just four weeks before the start of the 2020/21 Premier League season.

Instead, Manchester City's first game will be at Wolves on September 19, while Manchester United play



Crystal Palace at Old Trafford on that same weekend.

There are also delays for Chelsea, who travel to Brighton, and Wolves, who begin with a trip to Sheffield United, because of their European involvement, which ended around a week earlier than the Manchester clubs. Those fixtures will take place on Monday, September 14.

Elsewhere on the opening weekend, Crystal Palace take on Southampton at Selhurst Park, Tottenham host Everton and West Ham face Newcastle at the London Stadium.

It's a tough start for FA Cup holders Arsenal, too, with some testing away days early in the season.

After a trip to Fulham on the opening weekend, their next away games are against Liverpool, Manchester City, Manchester United, Leeds United and then north London rivals

Tottenham Hotspur on the weekend of December 5.

Having both sat out the opening weekend, Manchester City and Manchester United will clash in Manchester derbies scheduled for the weekends of December 12 and March 6.

Meanwhile, United's first meeting with fierce rivals Liverpool comes on January 16 at Anfield, with the return fixture at Old Trafford their fifthfrom-last on May 1. They renew their rivalry with Leeds on December 19.

Chelsea will travel to Liverpool on the second weekend of the season and will play at Manchester United at the end of October following a second international break.

Frank Lampard's side have also been given a headline-grabbing fixture and will face Arsenal in a big Boxing Day clash.

Key information on the new Premier League season

- The Premier League 2020/21 season will start on Saturday September 12 and finish on Sunday May 23, 2021 19 days before the rescheduled Euro 2020 tournament kicks off
- The season will begin behind closed doors but some spectators could to return to venues on a socially-distanced basis later in the year
- Opening weekend fixtures involving Manchester City and Manchester United have been postponed to allow those clubs extra time to recover from their involvements in the knockout stages of the Champions League and Europa League, respectively
- Chelsea and Wolves have also been allowed a short delay, with their opening weekend fixtures scheduled for Monday September 14
- The shortened season will comprise of rounds of fixtures across 32 weekends, five midweeks and one bank holiday. This compares to a typical Premier League season of 34 weekends, three midweeks and one bank holiday
- The number of matches shown live has increased from 200 to 220 for the 2020/21 season only with matches showing on BT Sport, Sky Sports and Amazon

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Union Conference Weekend dates confirmed for 2021

After the disappointment of Conference Weekend being cancelled this year, the dates for Blackpool 2021 have now been confirmed with the AGM set for April 10 and the Trade Show for April 9

The Coronavirus pandemic brought a great many disappointments with it for those in clubland as clubs all over the country endured that frustrating shutdown during the first half of 2020.

Another casualty of the pandemic was the CIU's 2020 Conference Weekend which was due to take place in Blackpool in April but was postponed and then inevitably cancelled in the face of rising COVID-19 infection rates across the country which led to the Government lockdown measures.

Meanwhile, a day earlier – Friday, April 9 – will see the 29th CIU Beer & Trades Exhibition being staged in the

Norcalympia at the Norbreck Castle Hotel.

This event is unquestionably the UK's biggest trade show for members' clubs with an array of products and services to discuss with the companies present.

In addition, there will be plenty of chances to win some great prizes with bingo sessions and raffles running throughout the afternoon.

After missing out on this key weekend for the Union in 2020, delegates will no doubt be looking forward to attending in 2021.

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New Eltham Social Club, London

New Eltham Social Club has undergone some ambitious refurbishments during the past few years and the latest addition to the club is a brand-new Lounge Bar and Beer Garden

Since its foundation in 1872, New Eltham Social Club has been at the heart of its local community in South East London but continues to adapt itself to the modern world through some ambitious building and refurbishment projects.

Around four years ago, the Main Bar, front entrance and reception area underwent significant modernisation and improvements while in the past year, the club has built a brand-new modern Lounge Bar at the rear of the club which looks out onto a very fetching landscaped patio and garden area.

"We began the Lounge Bar/garden project in mid-2019," says Club President Paul Caroll.

"We did have a garden before but it was just a nondescript fenced-off area

with a further patch of unused waste-

"About two years ago, we submitted a plan to the local council to build the Lounge Bar on part of the land and then extend the garden out.

"It took a while to get the planning permission because we're in a residential area but we got the work underway last summer and had the Grand Opening of the Lounge Bar on New Year's Eve.

"The garden was actually completed in April of this year which was obviously right in the middle of lockdown so the members had to wait until July to enjoy it.

"Everybody at the club is absolutely delighted with it though and the garden has come into its own during the summer, especially with some of the weather we've enjoyed since reopening.

"We're in a residential area so there are a few restrictions on the garden in that we're allowed to open it from April to September and have to close the area at 9pm each evening.

"The garden is a very spacious area which means it fits really well with the social distancing guidelines and we haven't had to change the outside table layout at all from how it was set up originally."

"In the Main Bar and Lounge Bar, we've had to reconfigure the tables and chairs to ensure we conform to the guidelines so we're down to around 50 per cent of our normal capacity in the Main Bar."

As many clubs have discovered since July 4, many members have

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taken the Government's previous 'Stay Home' message to heart and need some hearty encouragement to get out and socialise.

"The first weekend we reopened was very quiet but the numbers have increased week-on-week," says Paul.

"We have been really active on social media to let everyone know that we're open and that all the required measures are in place and I think that has encouraged people to visit.

"We've got a one-way system in place with an airport-style retractable barrier that guide members through the club, social distancing markings on the floor in both bars, plus we've been very meticulous in taking down details for the Test & Trace system.

"I think that people can see the club is doing everything it can in the current circumstances to reduce any risks.

"If people have got used to being at home, they need that encouragement and putting up pictures of our new garden on Facebook or Instagram gives them a good incentive to come down for a drink – especially when the sun is shining."

The club's online presence has also been transformed recently with a new website launched to show off the club to its best advantage.

"We've launched a new-look website in the last month which really helps to showcase the club and how it has changed over the past few years," says Paul.

"You might have people who haven't been here for several years or only know the club from the outside so it's a great way to show what we have to offer our members, both in terms of the facilities and the various entertainment events and other activities that are coming up."

Indeed, the club is renowned for its live entertainment and was the winner of the 'Entertainment Club of the Year' category at last year's Club Mirror Awards.

"It's great that live entertainment is back on the agenda as that's one of our strengths and we were delighted to win the award last year.

"We have a really good mix of entertainment, including some top tribute acts and comedy nights and they are always very popular. "We normally have solo singers on Friday and Sunday nights plus a band on Saturday so it will be great to get back into that routine as that is a real draw.

"Of course, it's going to be a bit different in terms of the economics while we're still working to a reduced capacity and we've had to postpone some of the bigger tribute acts as hosting them wouldn't make sense if we can't have a full house.

"The acts have been really understanding and we've rebooked them for next year when we're hopefully going to back to full capacity."

While live entertainment was absent until mid-August, the club's live sport offering brought plenty of members through the doors.

"Live sport is another big draw for our members and the amount of live football that has been showing on BT Sport and Sky Sports since we reopened, especially the Premier League and European football, has been excellent for us.

"We've also been showing the horse racing, Formula 1, boxing, golf and rugby. We have a big screen and

several large LCD TVs which makes for great sports viewing at the club although obviously at the moment we have to show events with the volume at low levels to meet the COVID-19 guidelines.

"Like many clubs, we were really looking forward to getting some crowds in to follow England in the European Championships this summer but that will now have to wait until 2021!"

Other activities which take place at the club include darts, pool and bingo while the club also has flourishing golf and homing pigeon sections which meet regularly.

Another benefit of membership is the chance to save money through a privilege card.

"We have a two-tier payment system which means that members pay less than guests," explains Paul.

"Money can be put on the card beforehand by members so there's no need for them to use cash to pay for their drinks.

"We also have regular drinks promotions to entice members to visit the club more often.

"We were doing really well before the shutdown and, like many clubs, have experienced a loss of momentum which has put a dent in our funds.

"But we're doing everything we can to bump up the club bank balance as



quickly as possible and then continue on our mission to improve the club even more.

"The next project on the list is to improve our current kitchen facilities but that will be on the backburner for a while as we bounce back from the shutdown."

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

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ACM offers a bedrock of knowledge on running members' clubs

The Award in Club Management (ACM) day sessions will be making a return as soon as is possible to help club officials achieve a good working knowledge of running a club. Club Journal gives an overview of the three-stage ACM qualification which covers key areas such as Club Law, Finance and Administration

In times as challenging as these, it is no secret that having a well-run operation is absolutely crucial to the financial health of members' clubs.

The Award in Club Management (ACM) course is specifically designed for CIU clubs and aims to give club officials a thorough grounding in the key aspects of running a modern and efficient club.

The qualification consists of three self-contained units, each taking one day of classroom-based study to complete.

Unit 1 of the course covers Law & Regulations, Licensing, Unit 2 covers Law and Regulations (Part 2) and Unit 3 covers Management, Finance and Administration.

Once a candidate has completed the course and been examined in all three units through a multiple choice examination, they receive the ACM.

The course is aimed at people who are going to be sitting on club committees and occupying positions of authority within clubs.

It has been developed to ensure that candidates gain a thorough understanding of licensing laws and regulations relating to members' clubs, as well as a whole host of other laws and regulations that govern the running of a club, including entertainment, the various copyright permissions required and the rules and regulations surrounding gaming machines in clubs.

The lectures are carried out by highly experienced lecturers from within the CIU who lead the day sessions and can draw from their knowledge of the club scene to illustrate the key points and explore real-life scenarios and problems.

Head Office will be rearranging new dates for the ACM day courses at various clubs across the country as soon as it is practical to do so, so look out for further information in upcoming issues of Club Journal.




